PITTSBURGH RECTOR WILL TALK SUNDAY

Dr. Van Etten To Give Chapel Sermon Before Alumni in Schwab Auditorium

WILL ADDRESS Alumni Chapel Audience Sunday

Speaking before Penn State's alumni for the second consecutive year, Dr. Edwin J. Van Etten, pastor of the Calvary Episcopal church of Pittsburgh, will deliver the chapel address before the visitors to the Seventy-fifth Anniversary celebration at 11 o'clock Sunday morning in Schwab Auditorium.

This will be Dr. Van Etten's third visit to Penn State in the past three years. He delivered chapel addresses on "Iron Shoes" last Alumni Day, and spoke in chapel the preceding year. Dr. Van Etten is a graduate of Amherst college and of the Episcopal Theology School of Cambridge, Mass. He received his doctor of divinity degree from University of Pittsburgh and Allegheny college in 1923.

To Organize Ushers. Having served as assistant minister of the Trinity church, Boston, from 1911 to 1914, Dr. Van Etten became rector of Christ church, New York and remained there until he came to Pittsburgh as rector of the Calvary in 1917.

Dr. Van Etten was president of the Pennsylvania Association for the Blind and is a member of the Holland society. He also is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Delta Phi fraternities.

Prof. J. E. Kauffuss of the Civil Engineering department as chairman and Dean Will Grant Chambers of the School of Education as major chairman, is organizing a group of ushers for chapel.
