

### Sidelines

Tomorrow's meeting between the Lions and Colgate is only the second contest between the two schools. The first game took place in 1911, and the encounter resulted in an 18-9 victory for Penn State. We will continue the series with the Maroon in 1931, and 1932, the former to be played at State College, and the latter at Hamilton, N. Y.

During the last three games of the season Colgate rolled up 178 points on St. Lawrence, Bathany, and Lafayette. Then the team struck a snag and lost to Hamilton State, 11-7. Captain Les Hart, of the Maroon, is one of the East's highest scorers.

Five members of Colgate's squad are Pennsylvanians. Tom Doyle, and Cy Sullivan, regular guard and end had from Erie. Joe Hill, former schoolboy star at Lebanon, is a guard; Eddie Volkwein, line-man, is a Philadelphia. Coach Andy Kerr is also a Pennsylvanian and formerly coached at Washington and Jefferson and Pittsburgh.

Walber Terry, who was scheduled to start against Penn State as halfback of Colgate's football team, is an athlete and scholar of the first rank. He has won letters in football, baseball, and basketball, and is president of the freshmen and sophomore classes. Terry has also compiled one of the highest scholastic records at Colgate, and plans to enter Oxford after completing his course at Colgate.

Bob Snyder, who may start in French's place at quarterback tomorrow in the Lion varsity, is a brother in the freshman class who is making a strong bid for a halfback position on the veering team. Johnny Zorollo's brother, Mike, is one of the mainstays of the State College high school eleven.

Seventeen grid contests last week were listed in this column on Friday, and five of the six winners were picked. This week we have a choice among with some evenly matched teams, but here goes with our choice in italics: Army at Yale, Dartmouth at Harvard, and Washington at New York University. Lafayette and Washington and Jefferson at Atlantic City, and at Princeton, Notre Dame at Pittsburgh, Wisconsin at Purdue.

Two of State's four remaining opponents will have an extremely hard afternoon tomorrow. Pitt encounters the Irish from Notre Dame in the latter's annual rush for the national championship. Bucknell meets the fast-moving Gettysburg team. The Bunnies have yet to taste defeat this season. Syracuse, after its hard game with Pitt, should have little trouble with St. Lawrence.

Maroon Has Great Backfield  
Coach Higgins has spent this week in bolstering his offense and perfecting a defense for Colgate formations. Only one scrimmage has been held, and that on Tuesday. In order to pick the flaws in his varsity combination, the Nittany mentor pitted his first string backfield and scrub forward wall against the substitute backfield and varsity line.

The eleven containing the varsity backfield succeeded in scoring once after a long march from past midfield. Then Johnny Badorf broke loose for a seventy-yard run for a touchdown, and later Bob Snyder tallied after a dash of twenty yards.

At 7:30 o'clock tonight Penn State students and alumni will gather in Schwab Auditorium for the alumni Homecoming football rally. David C. McLaughlin, president of the senior class, will preside over the gathering. Short speeches will be given by President Ralph D. Hetzel, Bill Hollenbach, grid mentor from 1910 to 1914, and Coach Bob Higgins.

The team will not be at the mass meeting. The Lion gridmen will spend tonight at Hecla Park, returning tomorrow in time for the game. Nittany coaches, in taking the team away from the scene of battle, follow the custom of previous years. One member of the squad will probably attend the rally as the team's representative.

### Varsity, Plebes Will Meet Pitt Cross Countrymen Away Tomorrow Morning

Chuck Messinger, and Dick DeWilder, both dependable veterans of two seasons' experience, Space, Napoleon, and King, members of last year's freshman team, and Sunny Glassburn of the 1929 varsity squad will be Captain Reker's running mates in the race tomorrow.

England, Vandermark, Rishel, Fletcher, Croson, Boal, and Norton are the yearlings who will make the Pittsburgh trip to run against the Panther cub.

and was literally converted into a quarterback overnight to replace the brilliant "Indian" Yabloh, last year's chess brained Maroon signal caller.

In the line Colgate has only two leftovers from last year's team, Johnny Orsi and Tom Doyle. Orsi, a junior, is one of the greatest natural wingmen ever to play for the Maroon and a star in Kerr's line. Doyle played end as a sophomore and last year was moved to guard as a fixture.

Cy Sullivan, Orsi's running mate, more or less alternated as a wingman for two years but this season is established as a regular. Arthur Schenkel, 220-pound tackle, stepped into a varsity berth at the start of the season and no one has threatened his job yet. Bart Lillis, the only sophomore due to start against Penn State, could not even make last year's freshman team under the masterly hand of line coach Fred Swan has developed into an aggressive tackle within the last two weeks.

Ralph Lockwood, a senior and varsity guard, has made his letter for two years as a reserve lineman. Paul Marsland, pivot player, was third string center a year ago but has

fought his way to the first team from the start this year.

It is upon these eleven players that Andy Kerr will pin his hopes for a Penn State scalp. No one realizes better than the former Stanford and W. and J. mentor that followed a scintillating first year here he is faced with difficulties at every turn this season because of the lack of veterans and a paucity of reserves, a department in which Colgate was unusually strong last year.

However, Kerr is a coach of the

first magnitude, and because his moves are generally one or two steps ahead of the other fellow the men on his squad cannot bring themselves to a feeling of outright inferiority. But fundamentally those closely connected with the Maroon and the players themselves know their best with Penn State and subsequent major combats will be struggles of the first water. Results should prove this, just as the Michigan State Spartans proved unpleasant things to Colgate last Saturday.

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
