Will Play Bucknell Soccer Team
In Alumni Homecoming
Tilt at 10 O'clock

A proven Nittany soccer eleven will stage the second game of the season when they meet the Bison booters of doubtful strength in an Alumni Day tilt at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning on the football practice field.

The Bucknell soccermen are beginning their second season of soccer and the coming contest will mark the major competition for the visiting booters.

Coach Bill Jeffrey will not select a final line-up before the morning of the game but will probably place Al Dyer in and Herb Masters on the bench because of leg injuries. The team that held Haverford to a 1-0-1 record, with the exception of these two men, will probably remain intact.

Anderson To Lead Attack

Bob McKune at goal with Captain Bill Hutchinson and Bill Henszey in the fullback posts will meet the Bison attack centered about Captain Peterson, center forward. Peterson played defense during last year but was recently shifted to attack. Koster, left wing on the Lewisburg team, looms as the strongest Bison line-man.

Bud Anderson at center forward will again lead the Lion attack. Tyson and Mueser will play on the left side of the line with Shephard and possibly Holmes on the right attack. Parsons, Longtrench, outstanding Blue and Gold defense men, are the leading opposition offered to this Lion combination.

The Bucknell team will engage in their fourth collegiate soccer contest when they meet the Penn State team tomorrow. Two games played last year were lost, while the game last week with the Stroudsburg Teachers college ended in a 1-to-0 victory for Bucknell.
