Modern 75-Room Colonial Hotel To Accommodate Visitors, Convention Groups

DINING ROOM PROVIDES SPACE FOR 300 GUESTS

Overlooks College Golf Course On Lakes-to-Sea Route West of Campus

Completion of the new seventy-five room Nittany Lion Inn by the Consolidated Hotel Service, Inc. of New York City, sometime in February, is the expectation of Raymond H. Smith, Comptroller of the College.

The inn will be furnished with a colonial type of furniture in harmony with the large spacious lounge rooms and open fireplaces. The main dining room will be able to accommodate several hundred people while a number of smaller private dining rooms will be available. Approximately seventy percent of the rooms are double and each has an adjoining bath.

The Consolidated Hotel Service, Inc. makes a specialty of constructing hotels for college towns and is operating colonial inns throughout New England. The inn here was named by the Board of Trustees of the College, but is being constructed and will be operated by the corporation.

According to the officials, the rapid growth of the College has exceeded community developments. The new building is a result of the lack of sufficient hotel facilities especially over week-ends similar to the annual Alumni homecoming and for conventions that might be brought to State College.

College executives are of the opinion that although 20,000 representatives of thirty organizations attended conventions and meetings here last year, a modern hostelry would attract many more.
