

FACULTY TO VISIT HEALTH CONCLAVE

College Will Send 7 Delegates For National Meeting Next Wednesday

Seven members of the faculty have received invitations from Secretary of the Interior Wilbur to attend the White House conference on child health and protection at Washington, D. C. from next Wednesday until next Saturday.

Prof. Milton S. McDowell and Prof. Allen L. Baker will represent the agriculture extension department at the conclave, while Prof. Madge T. Dought and Miss Ethel J. Jefferts, home economics extensionists, have also received invitations.

Prof. R. Adams Dutcher, head of the Department of Agricultural and Biological Chemistry, will attend the conclave as a member of the committee on growth and development.

Edith P. Chase and Prof. Marion S. McDowell will be present as representatives of the School of Education.

This conference is the result of a nation-wide movement, sponsored by President Hoover, to instruct parents in modern methods of child health education.

Studies and recommendations of 500 authorities who have been engaged for the past year in gathering data for this work will be presented to their various committees.

From this data the committee chairman will select material to be published in book form and distributed to every country doctor in the United States.

President Hoover's address at the formal opening of the conference will be broadcast over a national hook-up.

DEAN SACKETT DELIVERS "HOOVER DAM" LECTURE

Engineering Head Speaks on Flood Control at Friday Meeting

Because Crosby Field, New York consulting expert on refrigeration, was unable to attend, Dean Robert L. Sackett of the Engineering School delivered the third of a series of twelve engineering lectures in the Chemistry amphitheatre Friday afternoon.

Dean Sackett discussed the Colorado river and Hoover dam, dealing with the ravages of river floods on agriculture in the Colorado river vicinity. He showed how the proposed dam will prevent these annual overflows.

The Dean reviewed the total cost of the dam and showed what states might benefit from the completed construction.

Mr. Field will lecture on the "Young Man in Industry" at 11 o'clock Friday. The next speaker is an inventor and an executive of a prominent firm of consulting engineers.

ALUMNUS RECEIVES ENGINEERING POST

Will Direct Subway Construction Program Planned by Chicago Costing \$300,000,000

Major Rudolph F. Kelker Jr., who received his degree in electrical engineering from Penn State in 1896, has been selected by the City Council of Chicago to serve as chief engineer of a commission to plan and supervise Chicago's subway program.

Plans for the complete undertaking involve expenditures of over \$300,000,000 while the first unit, on which work will be started shortly, will cost \$12,000,000.

Major Kelker received his preliminary education at Harrisburg Academy and came to Penn State in 1892.

Following a year of post-graduate work he received a position in the engineering department of the Pennsylvania Steel Company, now Bethlehem Steel.

The next year he served as maintenance of way engineer for street car traffic in Bethlehem and later for the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

In the civil service examination conducted in 1908 to select an engineer to represent Chicago in subway and elevated line service matters, Major Kelker was the only one of twenty-eight applicants to pass.

Until the world war he occupied the position of supervising engineer. He served overseas during the war and there attained the rank of major.

At the conclusion of the war he resumed his municipal work in Chicago and in addition conducted private engineering enterprises.

LIBERAL ARTS DEAN ATTENDS CONVENTION IN WILMINGTON

Dean Charles W. Stoddard, of the School of Liberal Arts, attended the fourth annual convention of Liberal Arts deans of Land Grant colleges in the east at the University of Delaware in Wilmington, Delaware, on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

The association was first organized by Dean Stoddard four years ago and the initial convention was held at Penn State. Since then the deans have assembled at Rutgers College and the University of Maryland. Cornell will be host for the convention in 1931.
