

TEAMS TO REPLAY GRID DEADLOCKS

Intra-Mural Football Managers Rule Freshmen Earning Numerals Ineligible

All ten the games which occurred previously to November 20 in the intra-mural football tournament will be replayed and that freshmen earning their numerals are ineligible to participate in the tournament were decisions of team managers at a meeting Thursday afternoon.

In case of the games after November 20, the team gaining the greatest number of first downs will be the winner, the managers ruled. If both teams have the same number of first downs, the referee will pick the winning eleven. All varsity football men who played in any except the Marshall game are barred from entering intra-mural games.

May Drop Losers' Games

Because of difficulty in distinguishing players from spectators near the sidelines, the managers decided that plays in which a team sends one of its men out from the line of scrimmage are barred. When a team defending the east goal has the ball on its own goal-line, the ball will be moved out ten yards and put in play. This ten yards will be made at the referee's discretion. By this ruling, a team is given more room for its secondary defense when guarding the east goal.

Phi Pi Phi defeated Phi Kappa Tau, 18-0 Saturday afternoon. At the same time, Delta Chi downed Alpha Tau Omega by a 13-0 score. Phi Kappa Sigma forfeited to Chi Upsilon, and Varsity Hall ceded to Sigma

Alpha Epsilon. No games have been scheduled until next week because of Thanksgiving vacation.

Because of the short time left until the close of football season, it may be necessary to drop the proposed tournament for losing teams, according to Sterling E. Brown '31. The deciding game of the regular tournament will be played on New Beaver field.

COOPERATIVE BODY ENDS CONFERENCE

Fifth Annual Conclave Attracts 250 Agriculture Leaders to Sessions Last Week

The fifth annual Cooperative conference attracted the largest attendance since its institution in 1926 when more than 250 members representing over forty organizations were present at sessions in Old Main Thursday afternoon, Friday, and Saturday morning.

Following the annual dinner, attended by 100 members, at the University club Friday night, Charles Wilson, member of the Federal Farm board, and H. Edward Babcock, general manager of the Grange League federation, presented plans of their organizations for cooperatives in the northwestern states.

New and novel suggestions in credit extension and collections featured the Thursday morning session. Management responsibilities for cooperative

groups was the topic of F. E. Manning of the Agricultural Extension department, and member of the conference committee Saturday morning. Reports by H. A. Hennemann of the State Bureau of Markets, a general discussion, and business meeting concluded the program.


