

31 GROUPS ENTER MAT COMPETITION

Intramural Wrestling Manager Arranges Program for 30 Matches Each Day

Twenty-eight fraternities and three non-fraternity groups have been registered in the intramural wrestling match, which will begin after the Christmas holidays, according to George H. Young '32, chairman of the committee in charge.

The lists will be closed at noon today when at least three hundred students are expected to be registered in the tournament. Names will be bracketed and posted, together with opponents and the time of the bout, in Recreation hall immediately following the holiday.

Names of groups participating showing progress of the match, will be posted in the window of Station "D" clothing store where the trophy will also be displayed. Points toward Dean Hugo Bezdek's cup for the fraternity showing the greatest interest in athletics, and at the same time a rise in scholarship standing, will also be earned by placing in this match.

Official intercollegiate wrestling rules will be used, with the exception that the time for each bout has been shortened to five minutes. Also, a margin of three pounds over weight and any amount under weight will be allowed. However, a contestant entered in one class cannot wrestle in another weight.

Thirty Matches Each Night

Thirty matches will be scheduled for each night, three to be in progress at the same time. Coaches Alvin Morrison and Charlie Spedel, with the aid of "Pop" Garrison, will officiate, together with the wrestling lettermen. Other officials will be chosen from team managers and members of the intramural committee in charge.

All contestants will weigh in and undergo a physical examination by Coach Morrison before entering the ring. The first round in each weight class will be run off before starting second rounds, in order to avoid overworking one class while another loses interest.

The entries listed so far are Alpha Chi Sigma, Alpha Gamma Rho, Alpha Kappa Pi, Beta Sigma Rho, Beta Theta Pi, Delta Tau Delta, Kappa Sigma, Lambda Chi Alpha, Omega Epsilon, and one unnamed non-fraternity unit.

Other groups registered are Phi Delta Theta, Phi Kappa Nu, Phi Kappa Psi, Phi Kappa Sigma, Phi Kappa Tau, Sigma Nu, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Pi, Sigma Tau Phi, Theta Chi, Chi Omega, and Epsilon Iota.

Student To Fight As Professional During Vacation

Boxing fans of the Philadelphia district will see Penn State's only professional undergraduate boxer in action during the Christmas vacation when Joe Foley '32 meets Art Vetter, Philadelphia professional light-heavyweight, in the Norristown arena, New Year's afternoon.

Entering the ring for the first time in over a year, Foley, whose home is in Villanova, will return to the professional ranks against one of the Cleveland boxers in Eastern Pennsylvania, in the opinion of the Philadelphia sports writers. Vetter is fast and can hit equally well with either hand.

Foley has done little active ring work since he entered College. The isolation of State College from centers of professional boxing such as Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and the inability of following a regular diet while engaged in the pursuit of higher learning caused Foley to forsake regular boxing matches.

When he was only sixteen years old Foley made his professional debut in the Conshohocken Ball Park as a welterweight in 1924. Since that time he has fought eleven bouts, making an enviable record of eight victories and one defeat. He was knocked out once and the other two fights ended in draws. Although he began as a welterweight Foley now fights in the light-heavyweight ranks and expects to enter the ring New Year's afternoon weighing 174 pounds.

Foley has been working out daily in Recreation hall with the varsity boxers. Leo Houck, boxing mentor, has coached him and his familiarity with many of the present professionals has aided Foley greatly. Except for a bruised finger which he received when he accidentally hit the stone wall while shadow boxing he is in good physical condition and expects to be ready to give Vetter a tough fight.

BOXING TOURNEYS BEGIN JANUARY 12

January 6 Set As Latest Date For Registration—Houck Will Coach Teams

Individual competition for models and team competition for a cup will feature the intramural boxing tournament to begin January 12.

All entries must be made before January 6. Those not fighting under a fraternity or club name should register at Montgomery's, while fraternities and other organizations will send the names and weights of their entrants to Albert J. Zillgen '32, at the Pi Kappa Alpha house.

Winners in each of the seven divisions will receive special awards besides gaining five points for the organization they represent in the cup contest. Second and third places will bring three and one points respectively.

Leo Houck, coach of the boxing team, will give instruction in the fundamentals of the sport every afternoon from 4 to 6:30 o'clock in Recreation hall. Special short rounds will be used in the competition.

All contestants who lose to the winner of each weight will have a chance to fight it out in consolation bouts for second place. Third place goes to the loser of the final round.

Any organization of undergraduates may enter as a team for the cup competition, although contestants are not compelled to register under any organization name.

Women Lead Men In Health Record, Statistics Show

That Penn State co-eds are more healthy than men students is shown by records of the College dispensary and hospital for a three months period which began September 1.

Only twelve percent of the dispensary cases during September, October, and November are women students while co-eds form approximately sixteen percent of the College student body. During the same period fifteen of the ninety-five hospital cases, or fifteen percent, were women.

In November, however, the men showed an improvement in health and the co-eds took the lead with more than eighteen percent of the cases reported. The dispensary treated 1186 cases during this month, of which 209 were women.

October proved less healthy than November with a total of 2318 treatments, a jump of nearly a thousand over the previous months.

The College dispensary reports that 3147 hours were missed on account of illness, for which 835 excuses were granted. In addition, sixteen students were excused from physical education for physical disabilities, and twenty-nine from R. O. T. C.

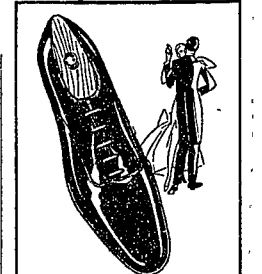
