Women Lead Men In Health Record, Statistics Show

That Penn State co-eds are more healthy than men-tudents is shown by records of the College dispensity and hospital for a three months period which began September 1.

Only twelve percent of the dispensary cases during September, October, and November are women students while co-eds form approximately sixteen percent of the College student body. During the same period fifteen of the ninty-five hospital cases, or infteen percent, were women. In November, however, the men showed an improvement in health and the co-eds took the lead with more than eighteen percent of the cases reported. The dispensary treated 1136 cases during this month, of which 200 were women. October proved less healthy than November with a total of 2318 treatments, a jump of nearly a thousand over the previous months.

The College dispensary reports that 3147 hours were missed on account of illness, for which 535 excuses were granted. In addition, sixteen students were excused from physical education for physical disabilities, and twenty-nine from R.O T.C.
