

### AROUSED LION FIVE LOSES TO HILLMEN

#### Brand Leads Nittany Scoring as Orange Defeats Quintet 50-33 Wednesday

On the crest of a twenty-point lead in the first half, Syracuse continued turned back an aroused Lion five's scoring rally to sweep to their first Triangular League victory against Penn State, 50-to-33, Tuesday night.

Spurred to a belated rally by the impressive lead which faced them at the end of the first period, the Nittany quintet launched an attack that gave them high scoring honors for the last twenty minutes, although they were unable to stem the New Yorkers' consistent offense.

A Lion spurt near the start of the second half talked six baskets while the Hillmen were held scoreless, but the Orange passers, regaining their early offensive power for the rest of the game, matched each Blue and White tally, and succeeded in maintaining their early lead.

Brand Leads Lion Scoring  
Fred Brand, returning to old form, led Penn State's attack throughout the game, making every point that the Nittany team registered in the first half. Opening the scoring, he kept the Lions in the lead for six minutes before the Hillmen started an impos-

ing floor attack that was not halted until half time.

Led by Tubby Hayman and Ed Katz, the invaders split the odds for twenty-nine points in the first twenty minutes, while Brand accounted for the Blue and White total of nine. The veteran Hill forward and guard both marked up six do-or-die-deckets.

Not until three minutes in the second half had three minutes in the Lion-continuation Brand in the scoring ranks. Moser, dropping in a cross-up shot, started Penn State's spurt, and Brand followed closely with his sixth field-goal. Succeeding another twoplayer by Moser, Conn, Blowers and Davis each found the basket before Beagle reopened the Syracuse attack.

Although the Nittany floormen continued to hold Syracuse on almost even terms for the remainder of the game, they could not bridge the wide gap which still existed between the two sides, and were unable to launch another organized attack. The slight advantage held by the Blue and White for second-half tattles, 21-to-21, was overshadowed by a first period margin, 29-to-9, that kept the Orange men always in the lead.

Flashing his way to the top of another scoring column, Hayman, speeily all-American second team selection for 1930, registered eleven shots from the floor and one field goal for a total

of twenty-three points. Pressing him closely, Brand, obtained seven shots from the floor, which combined with a perfect record of seven free chances, gave him twenty-one tallies.
