

College Physician Cautions Students Against Influenza

Warning students of the prevalence of influenza in the United States and in certain sections of Pennsylvania, Dr. Joseph P. Ritenour, College physician, advised that precautions should be taken to avoid the disease.

Although the illness has not reached the epidemic stage here, there are more students in the hospital suffering from influenza than usual, Dr. Ritenour announced, and urged students who are suffering from colds or mild cases of the grip to seek medical aid, instead of neglecting to take care of themselves.

"Influenza develops very rapidly and the patient often suffers frequent relapses," the college physician said. He also added that many times the patient thought that he was well simply because he has passed the acute stage of the disease.

"There is always a noticeable increase in sickness following a vacation period. Students who have returned to their homes may bring back with them a disease that is prevalent in the community in which they live," declared the Health Service director.

"A person who receives an infection of the influenza class should immediately go to bed and then notify a physician," Dr. Ritenour continued. "Late hours, over-exhaustion, undue exposure, and excesses of all kinds should be especially avoided at this time of the year."
