After amassing a record of twenty consecutive victories, Crosby, Western Maryland 115-pound boxer, was knocked out by Brown of Army in the third round last week. Crosby will probably face McAndrews in the lightweight division tomorrow.

The only four veteran courtmen on Lion and Mountaineer teams scheduled to start tomorrow night will be again individual opponents for the second successive year. Captain Sol Saltzman will meet Captain Lawrence Plaster of West Virginia at guard while Fred Brand will oppose Eddie Barting at center.

Every member of West Virginia's varsity quintet was also a regular on the football eleven, while three reserve players saw service as well during the grid season. Of this group, four will probably face Penn State on the gridiron next fall. Sotter, Doyle, Dotson, and Fairrot are likely members of the 1931 eleven.

MOUNTAINEER FIVE WILL OPPOSE LIONS

Invasers Climax 6-Game Week Here Tomorrow—Conquer Navy Wednesday

Battered but unsubdued after five encounters within a week, West Virginia courtmen will invade Recreation hall to face a Lion five eager for continued victory at 8 15 o'clock tomorrow night.

Coach Blue Heilmann will retain the same Blue and White lineup against the invaders that he started in the Western Maryland game. Jack Mazess and Walt Moses will pair at forward, with Fred Brand in the center assignment. Although Doc Conn is expected to be Captain Sol Saltzman's running mate at guard, Ed McAnn has been a close rival for one of these positions.

Seeking retaliation for the single-point defeat administered to them by Penn State last year, the rangy Mountaineers will make their assault on the Blue and White court at the culmination of a strenuous eight-day trip, in which they have secured eleven honors so far.

Down Navy, Georgetown After winning three out of eight starts before last Saturday, the Morgantown quintet started its intensive campaign disastously by losing to Washington and Lee Georgetown succumbed to West Virginia Monday 35-29, but Temple ran up a nine-point margin of victory the following night. The visitors turned back Navy, 41-36, Wednesday night.

The West Virginia passers have also conquered Salem, Marshall and Geneva footmen, by impressive margins. Allegheny, Pitt, and Bethany downed the southerners in close contests, while West Virginia Wesleyan took two games from them. Despite the wide difference in the number of games won, the Morgantown five only trails its opponents in total score by three points.

Replacing "Little Sleepy" Glenn, last year's scoring ace, Cotton Sotter is leading the invader's scoring columns this season. Johnny Doyle will probably be paired with Sotter at forward, while Eddie Barting will take the center position. Captain Lawrence Plaster and Leo Dotson will be running mates at guard.
