College Enrolls 559 Men, Women From 38 States

Five hundred and fifty-nine students representing thirty-eight states, other than Pennsylvania, the District of Columbia, and Porto Rico, attended the last regular and summer sessions here, according to a recent summary of enrollment conducted by William S. Hoffman, college registrar.

With sixty-six regular and seventy-eight summer school students, New York state had the largest enrollment of any state other than Pennsylvania. Following closely, New Jersey had a total of 122 Maryland was third with a registration of nineteen regular and the same number of summer school attendants. Eight students represented foreign countries in the regular session, and one at summer school Europe, South America, and Africa with five, two, and one respectively, constituted the foreign enrollment. One European attended summer session.

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NO WOMEN ENROLL IN MINING SCHOOL

No women are enrolled in the School of Mineral Industries and out of 1188 students in the School of Engineering, the co-ed representation is low, according to a recent report on last semester's registration. The School of Liberal Arts is second in total enrollment, and third with respect to members of the fair sex, with 116 co-eds to 891 men. Ranking third as to the number of students enrolled, the School of Education has 271 women to lead the list in this division. Registration figures reveal that the School of Engineering has the latest enrollment, followed in order by Liberal Arts, Education, Agriculture, with Mineral Industries, last.
