Following a period of twenty years at his alma mater in the capacity of professor of biblical studies and later biblical literature, the Dean was awarded his degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1919.

Spanish-American Club To Sponsor Exhibit by Mexican Artist

An exhibition of lithographs by Jose Clemente Orozco, sponsored by the Spanish American club at Penn State, will be on display in the third floor of Main Engineering building beginning Monday.

In conjunction with the exhibit, Prof. Harold E. Dickson, of the department of architecture, will lecture on the works of Orozco in room 107 Main Engineering at 7:30 o'clock Tuesday night. Discussing the frescoes of the Mexican artist, he will illustrate the lecture with examples of Orozco's work.

**Dedrick Attempts
Solution of Dust
Suspension in Air**

How long can dust remain suspended in air?

This is the problem which Prof. Benjamin W. Dedrick, assistant instructor of mining engineering, is attempting to solve by blowing quantities of dust into a room designed to prevent the entrance of air while the experiment is being conducted.

After making the room as nearly air-proof as possible, Mr. Dedrick removes the dust already present by collecting it repeatedly from the floor. Measuring out a specific amount of dust he distributes it through the air in the room by means of a large fan.

When some of the dust has had time to settle, the mining expert enters the room at intervals and collects it from the floor. In this manner he is able to calculate how much dust remains in the air.

"I conducted such an experiment nearly ten years ago," observed Mr. Dedrick, "but I was dealing in terms of ounces then, while now I measure the dust down to the gram. I see no reason why it cannot be done, although I know of no other experiment ever made along this line."

The only possible danger comes from fire resulting when the dust particles come too close together. This must be guarded against carefully, Professor Dedrick pointed out.

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**First Year Men Praise Helpfulness
Of Freshman Week, Survey Reveals**

What first year men think of Freshman Week is revealed in a survey of Education students from last year's incoming class taken by Dr. Carroll D. Champlin of the School of Education last year and made public this week.

According to the recorded answers, this period gave 114 out of the 129 questioned a good start on the first semester, and the following five months fulfilled the expectations of ninety. Suggestions for improvement of the orientation session were plentiful. Provision for private conferences with course advisors, a more effective plan for acquainting freshmen with the campus, better regulated hours in the dormitories, more singing and cheer practice, and a more friendly attitude from upperclassmen were the most frequently mentioned.

Joining a fraternity or not, financial difficulties, overcoming superiority complexes, choice of major and minor subjects, and "learning to control my tongue in the presence of upperclassmen" were the biggest personal problems of the men. The women were most often puzzled about budgeting twenty-four hours a day, mastering the technique of study, cultivating friendships with the right sort of
