Congratulatory messages on the success of the boxing intercollegiate are still being received by Neil M Fleming, graduate manager of athletics and Hugo Bezdek, director of athletics. The athletic association, boxing managers and the members of the squad all have been recipients of words of commendation for their part in staging a successful tournament.

Lou Little, football coach at Columbia university, wrote to Bezdek as follows: "Perhaps the most impressive thing that stood out in my mind of all the excellent treatment received at Penn State was the fact that your President came down to the handball courts to say Hello and to welcome us. Quite a few of the boys remarked about it and it certainly showed that he must be a real man. You are most fortunate in having a man of his calibre to work with."

Graduate Manager Fleming also received a letter from Coach Little which recommended that Penn State ask the Eastern Intercollegiate Boxing association to hold the tournament here every year. According to Coach Little no place can rival Penn State in attendance, enthusiasm and in everything else that goes with making up a real class.

Other letters were received from D L Reeves, Lafayette, Clarence Overend, Carnegie Tech, Harry R Henegge, Dartmouth, and L I Baker, U S Coast Guard Academy. Baker commented on the excellent fashion in which the bouts were handled, and the behavior of the crowd.

Since interfraternity games will be played this year with soft playground balls, the interclass league will furnish the only means of developing material for the varsity nine from those who have not gone out in active competition for the squad. It will also serve as training for members of the varsity squad who are not engaging in intercollegiate competition.

Spectators at Penn State's first intercollegiate gym meet complained of the length of the program. The inactive periods were due to the fact that one of the regularly scheduled three judges had a motor accident and did not arrive in time to officiate. With only two judges, needless delays were caused that are ordinarily eliminated.

Winter sports teams won eleven and lost fourteen contests during the season just closed. With only three victories to its credit, the basketball team accounted for twelve of the total losses. The boxers won three meets, lost another, and tied two, while the wrestlers won five dual meets and lost one. Winning five out of six games, the freshman basketball team recorded the best campaign.

NITTANY BATSMEN FACE DUKE FRIDAY

Open 1931 Season on Southern Trip Including Contests With 3 Colleges

Nittany batsmen will open their 1931 season by meeting Duke university in the first game of the annual southern trip Friday afternoon at Durham, North Carolina. Georgetown will be met at Washington, D C on Saturday, and the invasion will end with an engagement against Maryland Monday at College Park, Maryland.

The team will start on the southern jaunt with but six days practice out of doors. However, Coach Bedenk is relying on his veteran infield and outfield to bolster any weaknesses in the pitching and catching departments. The team will practice following its arrival in Durham Thursday and will engage in morning work-outs before each day's game.

Bedenk will give Bunny Stokes, the squad's only experienced hurler, the opening assignment against Duke. Meade and Yost will also probably see mound duty against one of the three opponents. Two other pitchers will make the trip, probably to be chosen from among Blowicz, Minton, Moonves, and Winn.

Clinches Shortstop Post Sol Saltzman, veteran catcher, will be on the receiving end of the opening Blue and White battery, while either Deterek or Swan will be named for chief service back of the plate. Regis Smith, member of the 1929 freshman nine, has clinched the shortstop assignment.

In addition to Smith, the veteran Nittany infield will be composed of Young at first base, Captain Jack Lavery on the second sack, and Dan Musser holding down the hot corner. Hoops, who formerly relieved Musser at third base, has been shifted to right field by Coach Bedenk.

An equally experienced outfield will take the field Friday. With Hoops out in the right garden, Yutz Deidich will play in center field, and Hobbs is slated to start at the left field post. Either Stockdale or Gaumer will be taken along as utility fielder.

After the southern trip, the Lions will start intensive preparations for the opening home game of the season against the strong Gettysburg nine April 18. The St Francis game, originally scheduled for the twelfth of the month, has been moved back to the twenty-second.

Navy Schedule Omits College Boxing Team

Arranging six dual matches, the Navy boxing team will not meet the Penn State mittmen next year for the first time in twelve seasons, according to a schedule announced Sunday. Swinense, Western Maryland, and the University of Pennsylvania are the members of the intercollegiate boxing association included on the schedule, while the Universities of Virginia, North Carolina and Louisiana will be new Navy opponents. The Penn contest will be the only engagement not held at Annapolis. Although the Naval Academy has not determined whether it will take part in the finals of the intercollegiate next year, failure to enter would mean dropping out of the association.

Edgar F Wolcott '31 who was elected captain of the team following the meet, showed the best form for the Nittany marksmen with a total of 272 points. Dan of George Washington university won individual championship honors with a 281 score. State showed its best form in the shooting from a prone position.

NITTANY GYMNASTS GAIN 38-16 VICTORY

Win First Intercollegiate Meet From Colgate-Davidson, Hesch, Brown Star

The first gymnastics team in Penn State's history won its first and only intercollegiate meet of the season when it defeated Colgate gymnasts, 38-16, Saturday night. In winning, the Blue and White teams showed definite superiority over the Maroon aggregation. Snatching four first places out of a possible six and tying for the leading position in one other event, the Nittany gymnasts piled up such a commanding lead that, from early in the contest, the decision was never in doubt.

Hesch and Davidson were outstanding performers for the home team. Matty secured one first place, a tie for another, and two third places, while the curly-headed star was proclaimed winner in two events. Captain Brown of Colgate was his team's outstanding man, securing one first place and two third places. Ending in a first place tie, the parallel bars competition was the most exciting event of the evening. The crowd was also entertained by the performances on the flying rings and in the rope climbing event.
