

6 SCHOOLS ENTER DRAMATIC CONTEST

College Organizations Register
For Play Tourney Here
Friday, Saturday

Six college dramatic societies have registered for the play production tournament of the Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Dramatic association to be held here Friday and Saturday, Prof. Arthur C. Cloetingh announced yesterday.

Competing for trophies offered by the association, the Penn State Players, will produce "Prayers for Peace," a one-act play by Dennis O'Hare. Two of the three legs on the permanent trophy have already been secured by the Players, winners of last year's contest at Bucknell.

Other comedy productions will be presented by the combined Frill and Frayn-Cap and Dagger society of Bucknell university and the Thiel college dramatic club. The Bucknell dramatists will enact Chris H. Kammer's "Jeeves," while the Thiel actors have chosen "Jazz and Minuet" by Ruth Grotloff.

To Present Specialty
Drexel's Rouge and Robe society will present more serious drama, enacting "The Game of Chess" by Kenneth S. Goodman. The Green Room club of Franklin and Marshall college is to be represented by a production of "Marching Men" by O'Brien. "Trifles" by Susan Glaspell is the offering of the Ginnson Mask society from Grove City college.

While judges are preparing their decision after all the regulation plays have been presented, a special production, "The Dent Departed" by Stanley Houghton, will be brought before the footlights by a cast composed of one actor from each of the competing groups.

Directors of the association, which is composed of fifteen collegiate dramatic clubs in the state, will meet after the contest to elect officers. The present officers, Professor Cloetingh, president, and David D. Mason, of the romance languages department, secretary-treasurer, will conduct the meeting.

Preliminaries of the Sophomore Extemporaneous Speaking contest, finals for which are scheduled on May 1, will be held in the week of April 20, according to Prof. John H. Frizzell, head of the public speaking department and acting College chaplain.

Following a first call to be made next week, entrants will be assigned topics of current or College interest twenty-four hours previous to the time of delivery. Individual speeches of five minutes will be judged by members of the faculty.

Six members of the sophomore class selected in the preliminaries, will give ten minute speeches in the final competition, May 1. Prizes for the contest consist of a fifty dollar award by the College to first place winner and twenty-five dollars given by the Forensic council to runner-up.
