

**RULES COMMITTEE
REVISES LACROSSE**

Association Makes Major Changes.
Limiting Substitutions to
Referee's Time-out

Two major changes were incorporated in the lacrosse rules for the 1931 season, according to a recent report of the Rules Committee of the Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association.

While facing the ball, and until the ball has been carried out of the center circle, the two opposing center players shall be the only members of either team permitted to handle the ball while it is within this circle. This change places greater responsibility upon the center players.

A second revision limits the changing and substitution of players during the match to the referee's time-out periods. Only when the referee has called time for some other reason can the captain of either team call for substitution. Previous to this ruling the captain could change the players on his team at any time throughout the match.

In addition to these revisions, the rule governing the referee has undergone a change. This regulation now reads, "In the event of a complaint being made and proved against the decision of either umpire, the referee may dismiss the umpire and appoint another, and, or set aside and revise the decision objected to."

This revision permits the referee to make decisions in regard to the justice or injustice of an umpire's ruling. In former years it was necessary for the referee both to reverse unjust decisions and to dismiss the umpire at fault.

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
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
