ORCHESTRA TO APPEAR HERE FOR FIRST TIME

Decorations Include Draperies From Balcony, Revolving Lighting Effects

Dancing to the music of Tal Henry and his North Carolinians, hundreds of Greeks and then Interfraternity Ball dates will frolic under a network of blue and white streamers in Recreation hall from 9 to 2 o'clock tonight.

Under the leadership of the "Personality Prince," as Tal Henry is known in jazz centers, the recording orchestra completed an all-winter booking in Dallas, Texas, before turning East to make its first appearance on the Penn State campus.

Must Show A. A. Cards In keeping with the decoration scheme, six fraternity booths will line either side of the orchestra stand and the entrance-way.

Showers of fire will play on the dancing couples when spotlights are focused on a revolving crystal ball in the center of the hall.

The floor will be draped in strips of white, blue, and gold cambric curtains while lattice work, trimmed with beach-sprays, will round out the plan.

No one will be admitted to the dance unless his athletic card and ticket checks with the list of names submitted by fraternity presidents.

RABBI WILL SPEAK IN CHAPEL SUNDAY

Norris S. Lazarus To Give Address At 11 O'clock Before Schwab Auditorium Audience

Returning to State College after a year's absence, Rabbi Morris S. Lazarus of the Baltimore Hebrew congregation, Baltimore, Md., will address chapel-crowds at Schwab auditorium at 11 o'clock Sunday morning.

Ordained in June, 1914, the speaker served in Wheeling, W. Va., for one year, after which he filled his present position in Baltimore. During the war he left his congregation to aid the Jewish Welfare League.

When ceremonies for the unknown soldier were held in Arlington cemetery, Rabbi Lazarus was one of the four chaplains to officiate during the service.

Class and Student Council elections have been moved back one week to extend from 1 o'clock April 28 until 12 o'clock April 30 because Move-up day, set for May 2, interferes with the dates for polling under the old plan.

With nominations for the positions closed at 12 o'clock Tuesday, campaigning will begin Monday morning instead of Thursday as originally scheduled.

For president of the coming junior class, Harry A. Bauder and Joseph D. Conn have been nominated with Herbert E. Longacker slated for the vice-presidential post and Grant Fleck and William S. Lenker named for the treasurer's office.

Nominations for president of the class of 1931 were Carl W. Anderson and Harry B. Balthaser. A secret ballot will be taken from John P. Beechler and James V. Rabston while William J. Baulhe and Jerome Parker were named for treasurer of next year's sophomore class.

Three 1932 representatives to the Student Council, representing the School of Agriculture, will be chosen from Richard R. Arthur, George K. Davis, Fred J. Jeffrey, Horace R. Josephson, and William M. Palmer, Jr. Seniors in Chemistry and Physics named for the two positions in that school were Robert P. Hindman, George D. Hodson, F. Merton Sav-bolt, and Earl E. Willoughby.

In the coming vote 4 1932 representatives from the School of Engineering will be selected from Robert C. Buehler, Charles G. Leis, Harold I. Martin, Francis J. Stegner, Edgar C. Wickerham, Harris K. Worthington, David F. Young, and George Zant '31.
