

Champlin Reviews "The Professor" in Magazine Article

The searchlight is cast on the college professor by Dr. Carroll D. Champlin of the Education School in an article titled "The Improving College Professor" appearing in the April issue of an educational journal published by the Phi Delta Kappa fraternity, honorary education society.

"The scientific movement in education has at last found friends in our colleges," the article claimed. "In this stronghold of conservatism there is now discernible a striving about to discover how the teaching process at this level may be developed into a more recognizable technique."

Tracing the progress of "educational method from the haphazard learning of Alexandria and contemporary cities, Dr. Champlin describes the modern college as one of comparatively secular character. The writer believes the picture of a college professor as a "low, ponderous, and impractical" individual, but paints the modern teacher as an efficient and scientific thinker.

In a study of the popularity of various teaching methods, Dr. Champlin found that general class discussion definitely outranked all other methods in the student's opinion, while independent library reading was placed last by the tribunal of pupils.
