

### GOLFERS PREPARE FOR FIRST MATCH

Coach Rutherford Will Hold Eliminations to Select Nittany Linksmen

In an effort to get his squad of golfers in shape for the opening two game trip against Swathmore and West Point next Friday and Saturday, Coach Bob Rutherford will hold eliminations late this week to determine the team for the first matches in the 1931 Lion golf card.

Since the College greens were opened Saturday, Coach Rutherford is confident that his men will make a good showing against the Gannet of Philadelphia and the Army. Captain John Murray and Freddy Brand have been exhibiting signs that characterized their play last season and Hugo Bezdick jr will be hard to dislodge from the position which he held last year.

Aided by the eligibility of Charlie Morrill, Coach Rutherford will have to observe his linksmen closely to find out the personnel of the eastern trip. Until now Gus Sackels and Bill Nacoss, two sophomores, have showed themselves capable of making strong bids for varsity berths. Bill McKay, a junior, is far from out of the running, and the same is true for Charlie Robinson '31.

In addition to the eastern trip with matches next Friday and Saturday at Swathmore and West Point, Lion golfers will meet Lafayette at the College May 9 and Colgate here on May 21. The varsity team will probably be entered in the intercollegiate tourney at Chicago June 23.

### WOMEN BEGIN SPORTS WITH SPRING ARCHERY PRACTICES

Opening the women's spring sports season, Miss Sara J. Lowenberg '31, manager of archery, issued a call for candidates Wednesday.

With those interested in archery divided into two classes, regular practices will be held on Holmes field several times a week. These classes will be conducted by Miss Lowenberg, who will be assisted by Jesse H. Rosenberry '31, assistant archery manager, E. Louise Hoffedtz '31, Irene M. Myers '31, Mary M. Westrick '33, Maiv A. Frederick '31, and Jane C. Land '31.

A tournament, to be held late in May, will close the archery season. Women qualifying in this contest will be named as an honorary varsity team in the sport.

### Experimental Black, White Rats Aid In Quest for Cures of Human Ills

With plagues and disease a part of their every-day existence, 500 black and white rats are objects of experimentation for the department of agricultural and biological chemistry in its quest for cures of corresponding ills in man.

At the tender age of twenty-one days, the rodents are taken from the breeding room in the Horticulture building to a "cell" where they are subjected to particular disease germs. Intensive observation and care is their next lot. Records back to the fifteenth generation are kept of the patients while notes punched in their ears are used instead of the customary flower for recognition purposes.

Separate sections of the laboratory are devoted to study of rats lacking in vitamins A, B, D, and G. Withholding foods rich in a particular vitamin from the rat's diet makes drawing conclusions on the rodent

reactions possible while administering medicine and corrective foods effects finding of cures. The rats found for the rodents is thus sealed to man's proportional reactions when a similar vitamin is lacking.

In the menus of the rats are to be found yolks of egg, milk, yeast, spinach, and cod-liver oil as well as more elaborate and scientific concoctions of professional chefs. Reactions to lack of vitamins through withdrawal of these materials are checked, and the progress of particular diseases is charted through the use of X-ray and other sources, such as physical tests and weekly weighing.

Work has been carried on in conjunction with the Rhode Island Experiment station since the start of the project by Prof. R. Adams Dutcher a decade ago. Experimentation and tabulation of material is the principal share of the agricultural and biological chemistry department in the undertaking.

### COACH ERNIE PAUL FORMS 2 CLASS LACROSSE GROUPS

Two intramural lacrosse leagues containing eight teams composed of men from the freshman squad and sophomores not on the varsity have been formed according to Coach Ernie Paul. The ultimate leaders in each group will play to decide the championship.

In addition to these games, there will be three freshmen-sophomore scraps, teams for which will be chosen by Coach Paul in respect to the players' ability shown in the other contests. Teams will be composed of eight men, and twenty-minute halves will be used in the games.
