

Sidelines

Falling in line with the recent action instituted at Penn State, Boston university has revised its athletic policy to make all coaches members of the faculty. The reorganization of athletic activities at the Boston institution is the result of a prolonged investigation by the president of the university and indirectly because of the Carnegie Foundation report.

If the Nittany trackmen are successful in downing the Temple runners tomorrow they will have completed two seasons in which they have not been defeated in a dual meet on their home field. The last setback handed the Lions on New Beaver Field was in 1929 when the Syracuse track team moved out the Nittany athletes 69½-10-67½. Pittsburgh, Syracuse, and North Carolina are the only teams which can boast a victory over Penn State in dual track meets since 1919.

In an attempt to break a record of fourteen years standing, Dick Smith '31 and Regis Smith '32, contenders in golf and baseball for varsity letters, will attempt to place a varsity '33' to the name of Smith held last by Robert W. Smith '17 of the 1917 Inverness team.

The Penn State linkmen will meet the outstanding college golfers in the country when they compete in the Intercollegiate tournament at Chicago, Ill. in June. Foremost among their competitors will be George T. Dunlap jr. of Princeton, the defending champion. Last year Freddie Brand was the only Nittany golfer to qualify in the tournament at Oakmont.

Jack Keller, Ohio State hurdler, broke a record of eleven years' standing when he won the 120-yard high hurdles in 14 and 3 tenths seconds at the Ohio Relays recently. Keller clipped one-tenth of a second from the former record which was set in 1920 by Thompson of Dartmouth.

Engaging forty-nine colleges in thirteen states, the football team of the University of Pittsburgh, has won 185 games, lost 69, and tied 16 in the past forty years. The Panthers have played more games with Penn State than with any other college, the two teams meeting thirty-three times on the gridiron.

LIONS WILL MEET MUHLENBERG NINE

Varsity Batsmen To Encounter Allentown Team as Plebes Engage Cook Academy

Lion batters will attempt to repeat last season's shutout victory over Muhlenberg when they engage the Allentown nine on New Beaver field at 3:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Dave Meade will probably take mound duty tomorrow, although Coach Bedenk may decide to start Hal Stokes against the visitors. Seltzman is almost certain to get the catching assignment for the Lions. Bedenk will make no changes either in the infield or outfield for tomorrow's contest.

Tackas, veteran pitcher, will be the starting hurler for Muhlenberg, while Symms, a sophomore, will be on the receiving end of the batter's Kiebschey, third baseman, Giltner, center fielder, and Canney, first baseman, are the only remaining veterans on the Red and Grey squad.

Freshmen To Meet Cook

The Mules have a record of two defeats in three starts this year. They lost to Ursinus, 9-to-1, in the opening game of their season but beat Dixiel by a 6-to-1 score. In the only other game they have played, they boxed to the Penn Athletic club, 9-to-5.

Freshman diamondmen will meet Cook academy at 12:15 o'clock. Parks, who pitched most of last week's game against Brown Prep, will probably be the starting hurler with Keri, Balchaser, and Lutscher ready to relieve him. Zawacki will be first choice for the backstop post.

Coch Leo Houck plans to start Marsh, Lucas, and Edwards at first, second and third base, respectively. Greenstone will hold down the shortstop position, while Slusser, Pimatom, and Jackson will get first call for the outfield assignments.

NITTANY NETMEN ENCOUNTER ORANGE TEAM AWAY TODAY

Penn State netmen, smarting from an 8-to-1 defeat at the hands of Navy, will cross raquets with Syracuse this afternoon and Cornell tomorrow. The Hillmen lost their first match Saturday to Cornell, 9-to-0.

NITTANY TRACKMEN TO OPPOSE TEMPLE

Will Close Dual Meet Season Here With Owl Runners On Beaver Field

A well-balanced team from Temple university will bring to a close the dual track meets at the College when they engage the undefeated Lions on New Beaver Field at 3:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Although defeated last Saturday by the College of the City of New York the Owls are expected to offset the Blue and White athletes' stiff competition in the track and field events tomorrow. The Temple runners are strongest in the event, but the Nittany trackmen have shown a weakness in so far this season.

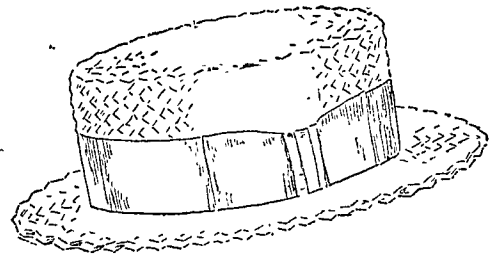
