

NITTANY STICKMEN OVERCOME INDIANS

Last Half Rally Enables Lions To Defeat Onondagas by 3-1 Score Saturday

Trailing 1-to-0 at the end of the first half, the Nittany lacrosse twelve scored three goals in the second period to defeat a worn Onondaga Indian team, 3-to-1, on New Beaver field, Saturday afternoon.

The Indian goal was made during the first minute of play when Pierce, first attack man, completed a short shot. Penn State scored in the middle of the second half when Edwards made a short toss into the cage. Smith and Heppenstall completed the Lion scoring.

To Meet Army Saturday
Captain Lewis and Weber played at the home positions in the opening line-up with Antonson, Carlson, and Smith comprising the Lion attack. Edel participated at center and Edwards, Decker, and Hook were in the defense posts. Day and McMillan filled the point positions with Gwynn at goal. Heppenstall, Crooker, Kiehl, and Cramer also played in the contest.

With three victories and one defeat on their record, the Nittany stickmen will meet an Army team at West Point, N. Y., Saturday and will end their season here against Colgate the following week.

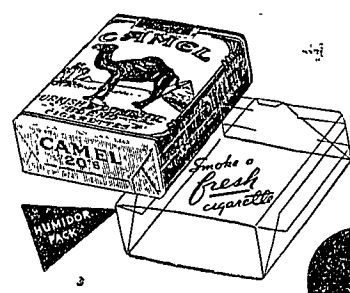
