

YEARLING RUNNERS OVERWHELM PITT

Lion Freshmen Win 8 First Places To Defeat Panther Plebes

By taking firsts in eight of fifteen events, the Penn State freshman track team defeated University of Pittsburgh yearlings 8 1/2-10-5 1/2 in a dual meet at the Panther's Stadium Saturday.

The Lion plebes captured the 100-yard dash, mile run, 220-yard low hurdles, 2-mile run, high jump, shot put, hammer throw, and javelin.

Adam, was the leading scorer for the Nittany athletes with firsts in the shot put, and javelin, and a second in the discus.

Aldrich featured the dashes with a victory in the 100 and a second in the 220. England and Croissant brought the Blue and White team victories in the mile and 2-mile respectively, while Vandermark finished first in the 220-yard low hurdles.

Clearing the bar at 5 feet 1 inch, O'Shea and Sayland tallied a first place tie for the Lion plebes. In downing the Panther freshmen the Nittany yearlings handed the Pitt team the only reverse they have had this season. The javelin throw was the only event in which the Penn State team was able to take all three places.

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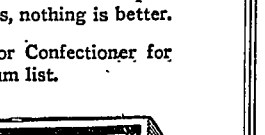
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MAIL PILOT MEETS DEATH IN CRASH ON MT. NITTANY
