and cultural courses offered during the six weeks, Dean Will Grant Chambers, director of the session, observed. The Music and French Institutes both have larger lists of applicants than before.

While students are registering for instruction at the College, branch summer schools are being opened in Harrisburg, Altoona, and Reading. The Altoona branch, in its eighth year, has broadened the scope of work so as to include graduate courses. Three hundred students are expected to enroll in these extension schools. Already sixty registrants in the nature study camp have begun a three-weeks course.

Among the new courses offered, a demonstration class with a group of children selected by intelligence tests will be conducted by Miss Lillian W. Butner, general supervisor of special education in Philadelphia.

For the first time two courses in ceramic art have been included in the list of courses, in response to requests from art teachers of the State. Professor Harold S. Nash, director of ceramic art at the University of Cincinnati, will be in charge.

Graduate work in art has been made possible by the addition of five courses, while advanced study in the Institute of Music Education includes private instruction in voice, and courses in elementary counterpoint, form and analysis, and free composition.

Dr. George H. Fickes, associate professor of religious education at Lafayette college, will conduct the first courses to be offered during the Summer Session in religious education.

**P. S. C. A. SECRETARY GOES

**Dean Watts Gains  
Honorary Degree  
From R. I. College**

Dean Ralph L. Watts, of the School of Agriculture, has been recently awarded an honorary degree of doctor of science by Rhode Island State College in recognition of his distinguished service to agriculture.

Graduating from Penn State in 1890, Dean Watts served for the next nine years as horticulturist of the Tennessee Agricultural experiment station. In 1899 he entered the field of market gardening near Johnstown, lecturing during the winter in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and New Jersey. Dean Watts was appointed professor of horticulture here in 1908 and served in this capacity until 1912 when he was appointed dean and director of the School of Agriculture and Experiment station. In 1916 he was honored with the degree of doctor of agriculture from Syracuse University.

**NOTED SCIENTISTS GATHER  
HERE FOR SOIL CONCLAVE**

Scientists of national importance assembled here Wednesday for a three-day conference in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the oldest soil fertility experiments in America.

A formal inspection of experimental plots was a feature of the conference. Reports on results obtained from the fifty-year plots were given Wednesday and Thursday by F. D. Gardner, C. F. Noll, J. W. White, A. L. Patrick, F. G. Merkle, C. D. Jeffries, and F. J. Holben, of the College agronomy department, and Walter Thoms, plant chemist of the experiment station staff.

Dr. F. P. Weaver, head of the department of agricultural economics, will address the adult local leaders of Keystone 4-H clubs at their conference here August 13 and 14. Dr. Weaver will speak on economic trends affecting rural young people.
