

Spirited Nittany Lions Open Season Against Waynesburg Tomorrow

Dick Detwiler '30, a member of two intercollegiate championship cross country teams while in college, has assumed his duties of teaching history and social studies in addition to coaching State College high school's track team.

Two centers playing their first year of college football will face each other tomorrow afternoon when Anderson, last year's freshman center, lines up against Billy Paul or Louis Rozzi, freshmen snappersbacks on Coach Frank Wolf's Yellow Jackets.

Announcement has been made that the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Pittsburgh will meet in football on Franklin Field November 5 next year. The Panther schedule calls for a game with Carnegie Tech on the Saturday preceding the Thanksgiving Day clash with Penn State.

Lafayette's football captain, Walter Vanderbrush of Dover, N. J., has suffered the fate of recent Penn State grid leaders. An announcement was made yesterday at Easton that Vanderbrush would be unable to play this season because of ill health.

Earl McCready, Oklahoma heavyweight wrestler who won the national title for two consecutive years, was seriously injured this week in a wrestling bout with John Maxos, of Greece. Two hours after the bout he had not yet regained consciousness.

When the Columbia University football team takes the field for its opening contest with Middlebury at Baker Field in New York City tomorrow, Lou Little, the coach, will not be present because of a broken bone in his shoulder.

Swarthmore's opening football game scheduled with St. Joseph's College tomorrow has been cancelled by Coach George Pfann, who had an understanding that the game could be called off providing the Garnet squad was not in shape to play.

Seven veterans and four substitutes of last season will enter the game for Syracuse when the Orange football team engages St. Lawrence University in the first game this fall under the arc lights of Archbold stadium tomorrow night.

During the past week Columbia has engaged New York University in a practice game. There was no scoring as plays which might have meant touchdowns were called back.

Tomorrow's clash will give Coach Higgins an early opportunity to watch his machine, which is relying upon deception and speed, battle a heavier opponent, for the Yellow Jackets will outweigh the Lions by approximately eight pounds per man. The opener will introduce Coach Higgins' new style of football including his military huddle and fast moving plays.

PROF. DUTCHER ADDRESSES CHICAGO BAKERS' MEETING

In an address last Monday, before a convention of the American Bakers association in Chicago, Prof. R. Adams Dutcher, head of the department of agricultural and biological chemistry, spoke on the changing food habits of present day people and accounted for decline in the consumption of bread.

"In the present day," Professor Dutcher said, "there is a very noticeable trend to greater variety in food. People are not content to follow a regular diet, but are continually searching for foods with new health-giving qualities. Consequently the consumption of bread per capita has declined in the last few years."

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40 ANSWER CALL FOR SOCCER TEAM

McKune, Henszey, Daykin Are Veterans Returning for 7-Game Schedule

With the first intercollegiate soccer game more than three weeks away, Coach Bill Jeffrey received approximately forty candidates for the varsity team at the opening practice Monday afternoon.

Among the veterans who returned were Captain Ted McKune, goalie, Bill Henszey, fullback, and Al Daykin, halfback. Tyson, Frank Evans, Dutch Miller, Holmes, Musser, and Shepard also are expected to be the mainstays of the Nittany booters.

This year's squad will be faced with the task of defending their undefeated record of last year, when they tied only with Harvard and Syracuse. Among victims last season were Bucknell, Princeton, Swarthmore, Lafayette, and Western Maryland.

Four home games are scheduled for this season, including Western Maryland on October 17, Lafayette on October 31, Haverford on November 7, and Temple on November 21. The Lafayette and Haverford contests will fall on the dates of the Pittsburgh and Colgate football clashes, respectively.

Blue and White booters will engage Cornell at Ithaca, N. Y., on October 23, and will journey to Syracuse, N. Y., the following day to meet the Orange eleven. The final away game will be played November 14, with Lehigh University at Bethlehem.

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SEEDED PLAYERS TO VIE IN NET TOURNAMENT MONDAY

To replace the usual fall practices, an all-College intramural tennis elimination of seeded players has been arranged to begin Monday. Thirty-two contestants will be selected on the basis of merit by the tennis coach, captain, and managers.
