

### 3 I. M. CONTESTS TO BEGIN TUESDAY

Tournaments in Cross Country, Football, Horseshoes Open Fall Sports Calendar

Intramural football, cross-country and horseshoe tournaments will begin Tuesday. Group or individual entries should register at the Student Union office on the first floor of Old Main.

In addition to counting towards the Bezdek Cup award, points gained in the tournaments will bring trophies for individuals, as well as organizations which win places.

The cross-country event will be run over a course of one and one-half miles. Only the first three men in an organization team to cross the finish line will bring the group points, but there may be from three to seven entries from one group in the race.

Two-man teams, either fraternity or non-fraternity, will compete in the horseshoe pitching contest. Organizations will be allowed to enter any number of teams, signing up at the Student Union office, with Dean Hugo Bezdek, or at the Theta Chi house.

Entrance fees for the football and cross-country tournaments will be \$1.00 for each team, while the horseshoe contest will require a deposit of \$50 for each team entered.

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### Murphy Appointed To Teach New Courses in Geography

Will Satisfy Student Increased Demand For Subject

With a view to satisfying an increased demand for courses in geography, Prof. Chesleigh A. Bonine, head of the geology department, announces the appointment of Dr. Raymond E. Murphy as assistant professor of economic geography.

Geography has received little attention at Penn State except in Summer Session up to the present time. At a number of the foremost universities it is a popular subject commanding a large enrollment. Dr. Murphy will be the first full-time geographer engaged here.

The program of courses will be in accord with the modern view that geography involves a description of the cultural (man-made) and natural features of the landscape, pointing out their inter-relationships.

Courses of study to be offered will include introduction to geography, world geography, economic geography, climatology, physiography, geography of North America, geography of South America, geography of Europe, geography of Asia, geography of Pennsylvania, field methods in geography, agricultural geography, and historical geography of the United States.

Dr. Murphy was graduated in mining engineering from the Missouri School of Mines in 1923 and received an M. S. degree in geology and a Ph. D. degree in economic geography at the University of Wisconsin last year. He was head of the geology and geography department at Concord State Teachers College, Athens, West Virginia, and taught various geography courses at the University of Kentucky, University of Wisconsin, Eau Claire State Teachers College at Eau, Wisconsin, and West Virginia University.

### First State Student Resides in Arkansas

On a little farm near Fayetteville, Arkansas, Penn State's first student is now living.

Dr. James Sanson Read, a retired physician, bears the distinction of being the first student to enroll in the first agricultural school in the country. In 1857 he entered what was then the Farmers' High School and continued his studies here, serving in the meantime as assistant to Superintendent Waring and President Pugh, until his enlistment into military service at the outbreak of the Civil War.

Despite his advanced age, Doctor Read has always taken a big interest in his "Alma Mater" and is a regular reader of the *Alumni News*. He paid his last visit here at an Alumni reunion during Commencement week in 1913. At this time, he met H. R. Rosen '12, who is head of the department of plant pathology and pathologist of the experiment station of the University of Arkansas, and the two are now good friends.
