To Give Winners Cup

The football tournament will get under way Wednesday night, Francis E. Schill '32, tourney manager, announced yesterday. One game will be played each week night, and three or more games on Saturdays when the varsity plays away from home. It is probable that ten-minute quarters will be observed, according to Schill. Games will be played under the lights on the practice field.

Equipment for grid contests will be available for all team members in Recreation hall prior to the game. Officials will be chosen from students in the Physical Education School and members of last year's varsity who are not out for the squad this year. A cup will be presented to the winning team.

The horseshoe tournament will open Wednesday afternoon, according to Charles P. Schwenk '32, tournament manager. Matches will be played on the course near Recreation hall. Two-man teams will be entered in the competition, and will play the best out of five games, except in the semi-finals and finals, when the majority of seven games will constitute a match. A silver loving cup will be presented to the winning team and possibly medals to the first three teams, Schwenk said.

Arranges Cross-Country Meet

The cross country meet will be held on November 4. Tentative plans provide for four-man teams, according to Homer G. Kessler '32, manager of the tournament. Medals will be presented to the three highest scorers, and the Nate Cartmell cup to the winning fraternity group.

All undergraduates are eligible for intramural competition unless they have received a letter or class number in the sport they wish to enter. Eligibility rulings further require that no member of a freshman or varsity squad shall be permitted to enter intramural competition in that sport except on approval by the coach of the sport.

No student may enter an intramural tournament who has been denied varsity or freshman competition on account of professionalism in that sport. A student cannot transfer from one unit to another in the same tournament during the course of the

Plebe Football Team Will Meet Dickinson Seminary at 12:30 O'clock

Eager for combat after a month of practice, eleven snarling Leon cubs will display their wares before an expectant Penn State audience when they meet Dickinson Seminary in the opening game of the season at 12:30 o'clock tomorrow on the varsity football field.

Speed and drive will be the keynotes of the plebe attack, Coach Conover has indicated in the workouts this week. Behind the stellar token-field running of Harry Sigel, fleet Bellevue halfback, the first team offense will not be denied and has crashed down the field time after time against reserve eleven.

On defense, the yearling showing has been less spectacular. Replacements have weakened the line, and center has been a problem almost from the opening practice. However, Woolbert, a converted back, is showing up well in the snapper-back position and will start tomorrow. He is a strong support to the center of the line in defensive play, but is still erratic on offense.

Dickinson Experienced Sigel is the team's best kicker, and with his kicks averaging fifty yards, competition. A student's name may be dropped from the list of intramural eligibles on unanimous vote of the Intramural board. Penalties for violations of these rules will be recommended by the executive committee of the sport to the Intramural board for final action.

"In keeping with the purpose of intramural sports, it is especially suggested that groups of non-fraternity men enter the tournaments," Albert J. Zillgen '32, student associate manager of fall tournaments, said.

Have Fast Ballcarriers
Lou Allen, rangy and fast, and McLaren are tomorrow's starting ends, while Webb, who has been tackling and charging like a veteran, and Kreizman will start the game at tackle. Replacements in these divisions include Watkins and McCabe and Hannah and Johnson.

"Mutt" Kessler, former Scranton Central star whom Coach Conover has converted from a center into a dependable and consistent guard, and E. Johnson will flank Woolbert at the guard positions. Neimi and Gosberry are the second-string guards, while Hayward will get second call at center.

Dickinson Seminary will line up with Downs, Freed, Smith, and Martin in the backfield. Brown and Caspel are starting ends, Karpovich and Kossa, tackles, Boston and Ferrai, guards, and Scott or Krosy, the center. Smith and Martin, at half and fullback, respectively, are dangerous ball-carriers and should provide the bulk of the Williamsport offense.
