

WPSC ESTABLISHES ADDITIONAL STUDIO

College Station To Broadcast From Main Engineering Unit Next Week

To improve the quality of its recorded musical programs, WPSC, College radio station, has acquired an additional studio, located in the Main Engineering building, to be used for such programs beginning next week.

The new space, to be known as Studio B, will comply with the necessity that the point of origin of transmitted music be some distance from the transmitter. All non-day broadcasts, which go on the air at 11:15 o'clock, will come from the new studio, according to Herbert Koopp-Baker, director of programs.

Installation of equipment is being carried out with the aim of providing a point from which all transmitted musical positions may be put on the air. This work is in charge of Gilbert L. Crossley, instructor in radio engineering.

Arrangements are being completed with Athletic association officials for broadcasting Saturday afternoon sports contests which take place in Recreation hall this winter. Mr. Koopp-Baker said these sports accounts will be broadcast directly from Recreation hall, he said.

"In order to improve our programs, it is necessary that we know our listeners' reactions," Mr. Koopp-Baker said. "We would suggest that students send us criticisms of the broadcasts, especially of the recorded musical numbers."

COLUMNIST GIVES JOURNALISM TALK

Donald Rose, Writer of 'Stuff and Nonsense,' Delivers Opening Lecture in Series

Donald F. Rose, writer of the "Stuff and Nonsense" column in the Philadelphia *Evening Ledger* and editorial writer for the daily *Ledger*, spoke here Tuesday morning before a group of journalism students.

He described his early experiences in the newspaper field, and explained the need for hard work instead of merely inspirational genius to produce success in any phase of newspaper life. Following the talk, Mr. Rose was entertained at luncheon by members of the journalism department and Alpha Beta Sigma, the college journalism fraternity.

Frank L. Perry, editor of the *Christian Science Monitor*, is scheduled to give the next lecture in the journalism series, although no definite date has been set for the talk.

Editors of newspapers in Altoona, Altoona, Chester, Greenburg, Harrisburg, Lancaster, Sunbury, Wilkes-Barre, and Williamsport have given tentative consent to send members of their staffs as speakers later in the year. The lecture series includes many well known editors and columnists, as well as experts in other fields of newspaper work.

Weather Changes Little in 10 Years

Weather conditions in this locality have changed but little in the past ten years, according to Prof. Clinton O. Cromer, of the department of agronomy, which is in charge of the College weather survey.

"A summary of temperature and precipitation monthly records discloses about the same mean average for the ten year period," said Professor Cromer.

"Our forty-five year recordings of temperature and our forty-seven year recordings of rainfall precipitations indicate only slight general deviations," he continued, "although it is true that certain months set high or low marks. This year, for example, the average temperature is deflected only minimally by 2.75, and the precipitation about 4.55 in comparison with the same period last year."

"Years ago when railroads and telegraph lines were set up," the agronomy professor added, "these two agencies were accused of disturbing weather conditions, now radio broadcasting is accused of the same thing. Radio service bulletins are proving this idea false."

Dean Robert L. Sackett, of the School of Engineering, will read two papers at the meeting of the Land Grant College association in Chicago next week. He is to read a paper on "Wise Engineering Programs and Depressions," and discuss another on "The Tenure of Office of Engineering Teachers."

Talkies Exhibited to Football Men Recall Higgins' '19 Touchdown Play

Recalling memories of Bob Higgins' spectacular run for a touchdown against Pitt in 1919, when the Lions won 19-0-0, four reels of a talkie motion picture were shown to members of the varsity and freshman football squads in Main Engineering building Tuesday night.

The films, entitled "Football with Knute Rockne," featured as one of the outstanding plays in football history the forward pass from behind the goal line to Captain Bob Higgins, who reached the length of the field for a touchdown.

Knute Rockne, late Notre Dame coach and of the prison, who accompanies the illustrated plays with his personal comment, stated that Higgins was outwitted by State because they

"were so confident that Penn State was going to punt" from behind the goal line that they never expected a pass.

In these films, brought here for the football men through the courtesy of Haman H. Collins '16 of Altoona, Penn State songs were used frequently in the synchronization by Pathe Motion Picture concern. Notable among the songs were the "Blue and White" and "The Nittany Lion."

Most of the plays were reproduced for presentation at Notre Dame with the Irish football squad performing and Knute Rockne explaining and commenting on the respective features of the maneuvers. Plays were introduced illustrating power, speed, deception, line technique, and strategy.

OUTSIDE WORK NEARLY ENDED ON 2 BUILDINGS

Opening of Home Economics, Dairy Structures Set for Spring

With outside structure work practically completed on both the home economics and the dairy husbandry creamery buildings, construction of these units is scheduled for completion in the spring, according to George W. Ebel, superintendent of grounds and buildings.

The outside structure of the home economics building will be finished in about a week, while the roof slab is nearly complete now. Workmen are putting up partitions in the ground floor and preparing for them on the first.

With the outside structure practically completed on the dairy husbandry and creamery building, workmen are preparing for the roof slab and are laying out for partitions on the ground floor. The super-structure of the creamery has been finished up to the ceiling-line.

JUDGING TEAM CHAMPIONS EMBARK ON TRAINING TRIP

Six members of the Penn State livestock judging team, championship winners of the Eastern States Exposition and the Baltimore Livestock Show, left Tuesday night for a three-week training trip which will be climaxed by a visit to the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago, November 23 to December 6.

Stops for practice judging will be made at Ohio State University, and the University of Missouri. The team will enter the intercollegiate contest at the American Royal Livestock Exposition, Kansas City, November 11 to 19. From there they will go to Iowa, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, where the State university farms as well as private stock projects will be visited for practice judging.

Graduate Films Purace Volcano

Taking the first motion pictures ever made of Purace, an active volcano over three miles above sea level, was the adventure of R. P. Ewing, a Penn State graduate of 1916.

This volcano, located in the central range of the Andes in the southern part of Colombia, reaches an altitude of 17,000 feet above sea level, and is reached only after an arduous journey as well illustrated in the film.

The *Movie Maker*, a national magazine, says of Mr. Ewing that only his determination to get the pictures was responsible for his success. The magazine also gives an interesting account and description of his achievement.
