

EDUCATION SCHOOL LISTS WPSC TALKS

Dr. Koos, Chairman, Announces
Speakers for New Series
Over Radio Station

As a part of the cultural and educational series which began Monday over WPSC, College radio station, the program to be continued by the School of Education was announced this week by Dr. Frank H. Koos, chairman of the committee in charge.

The series of seventy-six programs will be broadcast during the regular afternoon periods. Presentations of the various schools will be interspersed throughout the series, and two speakers will go on the air during each broadcast.

The Education School will trace the newer movements in education, and present the contributions being made by organized educational institutions.

Among the thirteen speakers from the School of Education will be Dr. Carroll D. Champlin, professor of education, Dr. Joseph E. DeCamp, professor of psychology, Dr. George W. Hartmann, assistant professor of educational psychology, Dr. W. M. Lepley, Dr. Frank H. Koos, and Dr. Bruce V. Moore, professor of psychology.

Dr. Charles C. Peters, director of educational research, Prof. Alvis L. Rhoton, George J. Rice, instructor in nature education, Prof. George R. Green, of the nature education department, Dr. R. G. Bernier, and Prof. Marion S. McDowell, Louise G. Turner, Ina Padgett, Ruth E. Graham, and Edith V. Harding of the home economics department, complete the list.

Lion Turkey Day Grid Series Ends

Penn State's grid machine will be idle on Thanksgiving Day for the first time in thirty-five years. The Lions' string of "Turkey day" engagements has been unbroken since Dickinson defeated them back in 1897.

The series of Thanksgiving Day battles with Pitt was begun in 1904, when the Panthers won, 22-to-5. In the next twenty-eight years, the Lions were victorious in seven games, the Panthers in nineteen, and two ended in scoreless ties.

Penn State's first Thanksgiving Day encounter was in 1890, when a Bellefonte team was defeated, 25-to-0. Dickinson was met and defeated three times in the next six years. The Lions first invaded Pittsburgh on Thanksgiving Day when they downed a Pittsburgh Athletic club team in 1893. No game was played in 1895 or 1896.

Dickinson was the holiday opponent, with a few exceptions, between 1897 and 1904, when the Pitt series was started. When Penn State bowed to the Panthers here on Alumni Day it was the first time in twenty-eight years that the battle was held here.

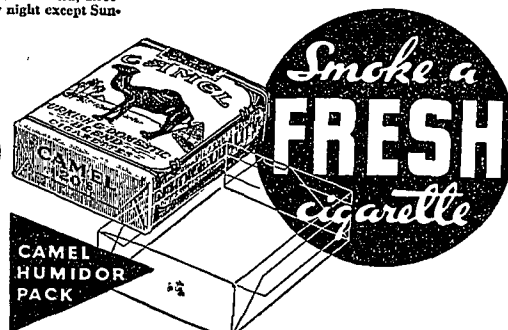
