

I. M. CAGE TOURNEY WILL OPEN SUNDAY

Teams Divided Into 4 Leagues To Engage in 3 Games Each This Year

With boxing and wrestling tournaments being organized, intramural basketball will begin the winter sports season when eighteen of the forty-eight teams entered meet in games beginning Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Every team, whether it wins or loses, will play at least three games in its league. There are four leagues of twelve teams each. After three games have been played by each team, the group or groups at the top of each league will meet in play-offs to decide the championship.

In order that there be no conflicts, all intramural contests are to be run off at different times. The boxing tournament will begin February 4, the first day of the second semester, and the wrestling probably at some later date.

Boxing, Wrestling To Begin Athletic chairmen from fraternity and non-fraternity units are to meet to discuss and register for the boxing tournament tonight at 7:30 at the Phi Pi Phi house. Entrants to the meet will hear a talk by Coach Leo Houck Monday afternoon in the balcony at Recreation hall.

Representatives of teams wishing to enter the wrestling matches will gather Monday night at 7 o'clock in the second floor lounge of Old Main building to enter the tournament and confer on regulations. Those who will participate in the bouts are to report at Recreation hall Thursday night at 7 o'clock. Free lance entries in both boxing and wrestling tournaments will register at the Student Union office in Old Main building.

Although the basketball begins with nine contests, it will be cut down to six meets every night thereafter.

Cow Quenches Co-ed Thirsts, 70 per Day

It will take seventy co-eds, each consuming her allotted part of milk daily, to keep the College dairy's champion cow busy during the next year if she repeats her record of the past twelve months.

Shattering all previous marks, the present holder of the crown produced exactly 27,270 pounds of milk last year, to raise the herd's average to a point higher than any since its establishment in 1889.

The seventy-five benign bovines, furthermore, are accredited free from tuberculosis, and give only the best quality certified milk.

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'Mary' Proves Most Popular Name In Survey of Penn State Co-eds

Say "Hello, Mary" to any Penn State co-ed and once out of every fifteen times you will be correct, for "Mary" is still the most popular name.

Forty-nine of the seven hundred and forty Penn State women have "Mary" as their given name, a survey of the student directory reveals. "Elizabeth," together with "Betty," ranks second with twenty-six, while "Helen" and "Margaret" are the names of twenty-five women each.

"Dorothy" is fourth, twenty-one co-eds having that name. Last year the order was "Mary," "Helen," "Margaret," "Elizabeth," "Ruth," and "Dorothy," sixth.

State Scholarships Employed by 14 of Freshman Students

Fourteen freshmen now enrolled at Penn State are holders of State scholarships, valued at four hundred dollars each, which are awarded annually to the high school senior in each county in the State who makes the highest score in a competitive examination. One other was awarded a similar scholarship to Penn State but did not matriculate here.

Eight of the recipients are registered in the School of Chemistry and Physics, while three were attracted to Education. Two are taking courses in the School of Liberal Arts, and one is enrolled in the School of Engineering.
