

15 TEAMS WIN IN I. M. TOURNAMENT

All Fives Entered Will Play 3 Games—Contests Began Sunday Afternoon

Fifteen teams started the intramural basketball tournament Sunday afternoon with percentages of 1000, in the first of their three league contests.

The first game, in which Phi Kappa Sigma defeated Kappa Delta Rho, 16-10, was played at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, while the last did not start until after 10 o'clock at night. The contests were delayed because only one of the three courts was available.

Phi Delta Theta defeated Theta Nu Epsilon, 13-10; Tau Phi Delta was downed by Ducky Five, 9-10; Beta Kappa lost to Lambda Chi Alpha by 14-10; Alpha Chi Rho had little trouble in disposing of Theta Kappa Phi, 18-10; and W. F. S. C. defeated another non-fraternity unit, the Five Aces, 12-10.

6 Play Last Night

Delta Theta Sigma took a decision from Delta Tau Delta, 15-10, Beta Theta Pi overwhelmed Phi Kappa Psi, 14-10; while Kappa Sigma easily found the Alpha Gamma Rho quintet for a 20-16 victory. Beta Kappa Alpha lost to the Commons Club by a 10-10 score; and Delta Sigma Phi downed Phi Sigma Kappa, 15-10.

Theta Xi had a hard battle to win over Sigma Alpha Epsilon by 17-11; Triangles defeated Phi Sigma Delta by the margin of a field goal, 16-14. Delta Chi stopped Alpha Phi Delta, 16-7, in a hard fought extra period battle, Phi Kappa nosed out Alpha Sigma Phi, 18-15.

Names of all players on group teams are to be turned in before games, since no man who has won a letter or class numeral will be allowed to participate in the tournament, according to R. Henderson Beatty '23, manager of intramural basketball.

The six contests on the card for last night were Phi Kappa Tau-Penn State Club, Phi Mu Delta-Sigma Phi Epsilon, Tau Sigma Phi-Phi Epsilon Pi, Phi Lambda Theta-Theta Upsilon Omega, Chi Upsilon-Rho Darnut Rho, and Hugh Beaver Club-Sigma Phi Sigma.

Former Lion 5-Letter Athlete Will Encounter Philadelphian in New York Friday

Penn State students will be anxious to see the ending of the fight between Steve Hamas '29, former Lion five letter athlete, meets Tommy Loughran, skillful Philadelphia heavyweight boxer, in the feature event of a four-bout card at Madison Square Garden, New York city, Friday night.

The bout will be Hamas' debut into front rank boxing after a series of twenty-two sensational victories over young pro heavyweights with nineteen of these ending as knockouts. A victory in Friday's fight will establish Hamas firmly in the limelight as a leading contender for the crown now held by Max Baer.

Net receipts of \$1,143 were collected at the Penn State-Lehigh football game for the benefit of the unemployed, Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, reported Saturday. The fund will be divided in three parts. Shares will go to the participating teams and the University of Pennsylvania, which donated the field.

The total receipts of the game were \$3,192 and the expenses amounted to \$2,318. The College's share will go to the State for relief while the Lehigh and Pennsylvania portions will be given toward local relief in Bethlehem and Philadelphia.
