

I. M. CAGE TOURNNEY NEARS SEMI-FINALS

League Competition Suspended Until Feb. 1; 83 Games Played to Date

Only six games remain to be played in the league competition of twelve intramural basketball tournament all of these in the fifth group of twelve teams. About fifteen teams are expected to compete in the finals by virtue of maintaining an average of 1,000 percent of the best competitive average in their league contests.

There will be no more games played until Monday night, February 1, according to R. Henderson Beatty '33, manager of the tournament. The six remaining games will be played off then and the league winners announced.

60 Teams Entered

Thursday night saw Alpha Tau Omega fall victim to the Penn State Ramblers, 22-to-9; Phi Delta Theta defeated Kappa Delta Rho, 17-to-12; Sigma Tau Phi had a hard time to nose out Alpha Zeta, 5-to-4; Beta Sigma Rho won over Phi Pi Phi, 24-to-17, and Alpha Kappa Pi forfeited to Delta Upsilon.

Sigma Pi downed Alpha Tau Omega 28-to-22, on Friday night; Chi Phi hopped a 24-to-15 win over Beta Sigma Rho, the Penn State Ramblers continued their winning streak, taking over Phi Kappa Nu, 22-to-10; Tau Kappa Epsilon scored a victory by 28-to-17 over Phi Pi Phi, and Sigma Tau Phi lost to Alpha Kappa Pi, 14-to-13.

So far, the sixty teams entered in the five leagues have played in eighty-three games, while seven scheduled contests were forfeited. Three games were to be played by each fraternity and non-fraternity group in the competition.

MORRISON TO INSTRUCT INTRAMURAL GRAPPLERS

Organizations May Enter Teams at Union Office by February 20

Practice periods for the intramural wrestling tournament will be held in Recreation hall immediately after the beginning of the second semester under the supervision of Coach Allie Morrison. These periods will be held on Monday and Thursday nights at 7 o'clock.

Organizations may enter men in this tournament by registering their names at the Student Union desk before February 20, and by depositing a twenty-five cent entrance fee for each man. A team may enter as it wishes for any weight.

The tournament will begin early in March, and continue until all matches are completed. Eight minutes will constitute a match, with one minute overtime bouts if necessary. A sixty-second time advantage will count the same as a fall.

The School of Engineering is Electrical Engineering 21, "Electrical Generating Stations." Mr. Albert P. Powell will instruct students in this course.

The comparatively new School of Physical Education and Athletics will feature three new courses. Prof. Elwood C. Davis will start two of these, Physical Education 58, "The History, Growth and Development of Physical Education," and Physical Education 212, "Teaching Supervision of Health and Physical Education." He and Dr. Joseph P. Ritenour, the College Physician, will jointly teach Physical Education 105, "Safety Education and First Aid."

Changes in Time Table

The only new course to be offered by the department of journalism is Journalism 68, "The Law of the Press," given by Prof. Sheldon C. Tanner. The School of Chemistry and Physics also offers one new course, Physical Chemistry 20, "Elementary Crystal Structures," by Dr. Wheeler P. Davey.

Four scheduling changes have been made which are not in the time table and of which Mr. Bixey cautions students to notice before registering for the second semester. French 448 has been changed to Monday, Thursday, and Saturday at 11 o'clock. Animal Husbandry 30 has been changed to Tuesday and Friday at 9 o'clock, while Metallurgy 57 has been changed from Wednesday at 1 o'clock to 11 o'clock on the same day. Since the printing of the time tables it has been found that Spanish 438 will not be offered next semester.

Western College Wrestling More Rugged, Says Morrison

Freshman Mat Coach, 1928 Olympic Champion, Believes Eastern Style Inferior

Western college wrestling is of a more rugged type than that found in the East, according to Allie Morrison, freshman wrestling coach and former University of Illinois captain.

"The mid-western grappler makes greater use of his legs than does the eastern wrestler," said Morrison. "Head and body scissos holds are more used and in general the western man takes more punishment than his eastern rival."

When asked which technique he believed the best, the freshman mentor pointed out that the western style has been proved the superior in past performances, citing the Oklahoma A. and M. record as the best in the country. He also noted that six out of seven men to represent the United States on the 1928 Olympic wrestling team came from the west.

Morrison himself was a member of that 1928 Olympic team and was the only American to win an Olympic championship. Competing in the 135-pound class, he gained an easy decision over the Swiss champion in the finals after defeating the 1924 Olympic champion in a semi-final bout.

The Olympic title was only one of many captured by the freshman coach before he retired from active competition, however. While still in high school at Marshalltown, Iowa, he won the national A. U. 135-pound championship. In 1928 he was Big Ten champion, capturing the University of Illinois team that year. He is undecided as to whether he will try for the Olympic team this year, although he is thinking seriously of entering the competition.

The widespread popularity of wrestling in the west is cited as the main reason for the prominence of western matmen by Morrison. Wrestling is taught in high schools in Iowa, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Nebraska, and therefore, the college squads are composed of men who have had several years of experience.
