

### Lion Courtmen Encounter Bucknell Tomorrow Night

#### Down Orange Quintet By 41-33—Bow to Penn Five

Since last these columns chronicled the court fortunes of Penn State's Lions, an undefeated record has been snapped. Syracuse has bowled a Blue and White basketball team for the first time in 3 years, and a sophomore star has taken his place in the Nittany firmament.

Norty McFarlane is Coach Hermann's sophomore sensation, and he is certain to occupy one of the forward posts in the greatly revamped lineup starting against Bucknell at 7 o'clock tomorrow night in Recreation hall. Wally Walus, another fast newcomer, is Hermann's selection as the other forward, and Captain Freddy Brand and Ed McMinn are certain to center and guard, respectively. Either Jack Meyers or Doc Conn will complete the starting combination at guard.

**Chenoweth Stars**  
The Bisons come here tomorrow night with a team which offers a serious threat to the Nittany quintet's undefeated record on their home floor. Although they have lost half of the six games they have played to date, the way in which they held powerful Duquesne to a 31-to-25 score in their last game proved that they are constantly improving. They have also been defeated by Lafayette, 36-to-26, and by Temple, 37-to-33, while they held victories over East Stroudsburg, Western Maryland, and Troop B of the Pennsylvania National Guard.

Chenoweth, a dynamic little veteran who puts difficult shots in with deadly accuracy, leads the Herd's offensive attack from his position at forward. With him is paired McKenzie, a forward from Philadelphia. The center, Owen James, is a six-foot-one sophomore from Scranton, while two veterans, Captain Jimmy Logan and Bob Hepler, complete the starting lineup at guard. A long test has put the Lewisburg five on edge, and it is our prediction they'll make things interesting for the Lions tomorrow night.

A 32-to-25 victory over Keystone Academy and successive defeats by Wyoming Seminary, Syracuse freshmen and Catholic University freshmen represents the Williamsport aggregation's record to date.

**Will Start First Team**  
All four of these first games were played away from home, a contest with Cook Academy at Williamsport tonight marking the first home appearance for the Seminary team. Both Cook Academy and Wyoming Seminary are on the yearling schedule this year.

Although one or two last minute changes are possible, Coach Larry Conover has indicated that he will start the combination that has been regarded as the first team since the early practice scrimmage sessions were inaugurated. This will send Stocker and Milom to the forward posts, Gillard to center, and Fletcher and Kilmoyer to the guard positions.

Dickinson Seminary will use Fred and Anderson at the forward berths, Brown center, and Foster and Downs, guards. Painton, Karpovich, and Kossa, who saw action in the freshman Dickinson Seminary football game here last fall, are substitutes who may break into the lineup.
