Penn State's track team doesn't count for much in the prognostications of certain Philadelphia sports writers upon the intercollegiate indoor track meet to be held in New York tomorrow. Penn has been doped out as the winner of the meet, although supposed to rate only a very few points above New York University, which is placed second. Cornell's endermen are ranked third, followed by Harvard.

These same writers pick McCuskey of Fordham, who broke Paul Reker's record last year, as a topheavy favorite to come through well ahead of the rest of the field in the two-mile run.

North Carolina, Penn State's only ring opponent from down where they grow accents naturally, failed to make a very impressive showing in the recent southern conference boxing championships. Among nine teams, the Tar Heels finished in a triple tie for last place. Virginia won the title.

The Nittany Lion and the Pitt Panther will trot out the old football togs and loosen up their kick-logs on the same day. Jack Sutherland, Pittsburgh mentor, issued a call for his gridmen to appear at the first practice Monday.

Together with Conover and Hermann, Joe Miller and Marty McAndrews will assist Higgins with the spring drills. After next Saturday the wrestling intercollegiate will be over and Charlie Spedel will look after the medicine kit and perhaps give a few calisthenics daily.

The purpose of spring training is to encourage those who have never been out for varsity football before, to show their worth in the coaches' eyes. All lettermen and holdovers from this season's squad are expected to report Monday afternoon.
