worked the past two years as assistant football coach, echoes Director Berdek's sentiments. "We all shall miss Dutch," he says. "I feel that he extended a wonderful loyalty to me, personally. His greatest desire was for the best interests of the school he served, and it will be hard to find someone who will truly take the place of the College's oldest coach."

Captain Freddy Brand spoke for the 1932 Lion quintet when he said, "Dutch has worked with us so long that we hate to see him leave. Yet, we realize that his return to his studies is an attempt toward a higher goal, and we wish him the utmost success." The ideals of sportsmanship and fair play which he symbolized have set a high standard for future Penn State teams.

Dutch played football and basketball in his undergraduate days here and was captain of the cage team in 1912, the year he was graduated. After his graduation, he taught at Wilkes-Barre high school and Shady-side Academy. He returned here in 1916 as assistant basketball coach and was advanced to the position of head coach the following year. He coached the freshman football team until 1930, when he took over his duties as backfield coach of the varsity.
