Agriculture School Head Will Give
Talk Tomorrow Afternoon

Speaking on "The Promised Land," Dean Ralph L. Watts, of the School of Agriculture, will give a lecture to faculty members and students in Room 100, Horticulture building, at 4-10 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The lecture, one of the agriculture series, will be based upon material acquired by Dean Watts during a visit to Palestine several years ago. It will deal with agricultural conditions and geographical features in the Holy Land.

Dean Watts will illustrate his talk with more than eighty slides, many of which were made from photographs taken by him.
