

BATSMEN DEFEAT ORANGE NINE, 5-3

Win First Triangular Cup Game As Al DeBonis Scatters Opponents' Hits

Penn State's triangular baseball champions served notice Saturday that they must be reckoned in the running for the 1932 title by turning back Syracuse, 5-3, in their first defense of the title game last season.

A nine-hit pitching performance on the part of Al DeBonis coupled with timely hitting on the part of his teammates served to defeat the Orange nine DeBonis kept the invaders' hits well scattered until the eighth to gain his first victory of the season.

While the veteran righthander was giving his masterful exhibition on the mound, his team-mates, led by Regis Smith, Harold Brewster and "Zep" Zawacki, were collecting eleven safe blows from the deliveries of Bradley and Black, who toiled on the rubber for Syracuse. Smith enjoyed a perfect day at the plate with four singles in as many times at bat, while Brewster and Zawacki each contributed a pair of timely hits to the Lion cause.

Replaces Moonves

Brewster made his first start as a center fielder, taking the place of the injured Phil Moonves at this position. Coach Joe Budenk also shifted his infield for the game, sending Zawacki to first base in place of Marsh, and replacing Wallus with George Chorbak at second soon after the game got under way.

Handling ten chances without a miss, shortstop Bill Lohr turned in the flashiest work of the day, with the ever-dependable Smith close at his heels with six chances without an error. Back, Sulkowski and Munster led the visitors at the plate with two hits each.

Freshmen Win

Coach Leo Houck's 1932 edition of the freshman baseball team handed a ragged Bellefonte Academy nine a 13-to-4 trouncing to open its season. Seltzer and Woolbert composed the freshman battery, while Voight and Bogness handled the assignment for Bellefonte. Hits on both pitches were evenly distributed, Seltzer allowing nine and Voight ten. Only one State substitution was made during the entire game, when Llewellyn replaced Maybee at center field in the fourth inning.

Seltzer led the freshman scoring, with three runs to his credit. Volk, shortstop, Dudy, third base, Stocker, second base, Callahan, left field, and Woolbert each scored two runs. A run apiece was made by Daulton, third base, and Williams, right field.

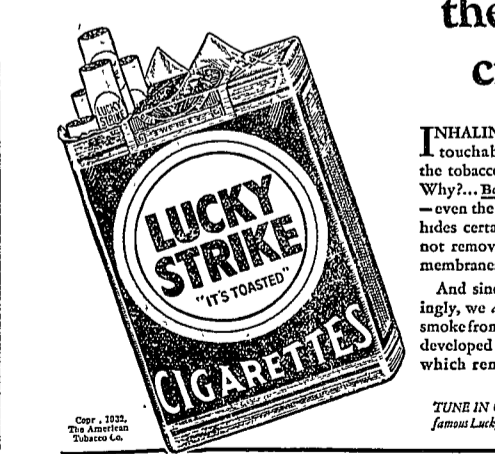
