## Batsmen Will Seek Second Straight Victory Tomorrow

### Meade Scheduled for Mound Duty—Team Lineup Same

It was last October that a little Dickinson College football team visited New Beaver Field, lined up against a Nittany Lion team and proceeded to score a 10-to-7 victory. Tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock another Dickinson team, again the underdog, will appear on New Beaver Field diamond as the opponent of the Nittany batsmen.

However, it isn't likely that the Carlisle nine is in line for another upset victory. The Lion diamond representatives are wary of their foe, and they're also very determined to hang up another victory, their second straight since the Eastern trip.

**Lineup Unchanged**  
The baseballers may have an opportunity to gain a little revenge for their football brethren. Slated as a possible pitching choice for Dickinson is one Dick, the same lad who tossed a forward pass that resulted in a touchdown for the Carlisle eleven last October, and then kicked a field goal from the twenty-yard line that eventually won the game for the visiting team.

Dave Meade seems the most likely to get the hurling assignment for the Lion tossers. The southpaw worked two hard games on the Eastern trip, but has had a full two weeks' rest and should be in good form tomorrow.

No change is expected in the rest of the Nittany lineup. Both Zawacki and Brewster demonstrated last Saturday against Syracuse that they will be hard to dislodge from the first base and center field positions, and the other six men are certain to start.

Opening their series in 1910, Penn State and Dickinson have met eleven times on the baseball diamond with the Lion representatives taking the decision in every meeting. Last year's contest resulted in a 3-2 triumph.

**Freshmen Play Here**  
Fresh from their 13-4 drubbing of Bellefonte Academy in the opening game last week, yearling batsmen will attempt to chalk up the second victory of the season against McKeesport high school on New Beaver Field at 12:30 o'clock tomorrow.

The Seltzer-Woolbert combination will probably get the battery call again tomorrow. Symington at first, Stocker at second, Volk at shortstop, and Daily at third may see infield service as they did in the opener last week.

Williams will probably be used at right field and Callahan at left. The center field position will be held down by either Maybee or Llewellyn.

## Kasczak Leads Lion Batters With .312

With ten hits in thirty-two times at bat for a .312 average, Bill Kasczak, sophomore outfielder is the leading batter on the varsity baseball team for the season to date. Kasczak is the only regular above the .200 mark, Captain George Hoopes' .275 gaining second place. Two other members of the varsity top Kasczak's .312, Phil Moonves sporting a .527 mark and Zawaeki a .461 average, but neither has taken part in every game, as has the left fielder. Included in Kasczak's ten hits are two home runs, three triples and a double, giving him a total of twenty-three bases on the ten bingles.

### To Face Nittany Racquet Welders In Match Here at 3 O'clock Tomorrow Afternoon

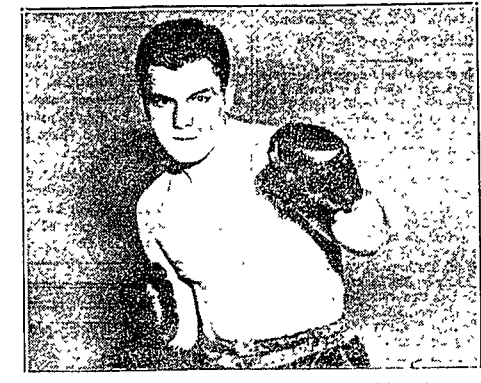

Steve Hamas '29 outpointed Tommy Loughran, Philadelphia heavyweight, for his 30th professional victory Wednesday night and his second over the former light heavyweight champion. Steve knocked out Loughran in two rounds when they first met in New York City last winter. The former Nittany star won the vote of one judge and the referee, with the latter's ballot deciding the fight for the ex-Lion. Hamas won eight of the ten rounds with one even and one going to Loughran in the opinion of the referee. By virtue of his victory, Steve moves up to definitely establish himself as one of the leading heavyweights of the country.

## Lacrosse Men Will Engage Terrapins Here Tomorrow

With its eye on a possible Olympic championship, a fast Maryland lacrosse twelve will invade Lion territory tomorrow afternoon determined to keep its undefeated record clean. The Nittany stickmen will be in plenty of tough going at 2 o'clock on New Beaver Field.

Three weeks ago a rather formidable St. Johns twelve opened the Lion season by handing out a 10-to-1 setback. That same team invaded Maryland's territory last Saturday only to come out of the ensuing fracas with its tail between its legs, decisively defeated 5-to-2.

Maryland has trampled her four other opponents this year, Washington College, Georgia, Virginia, and Rutgers, all falling before the Terrapins' onslaught. The Old Lineers are noted for their fast game, invariably out-running their opponents. Last year they completely shut out the Lions, 13-to-0.

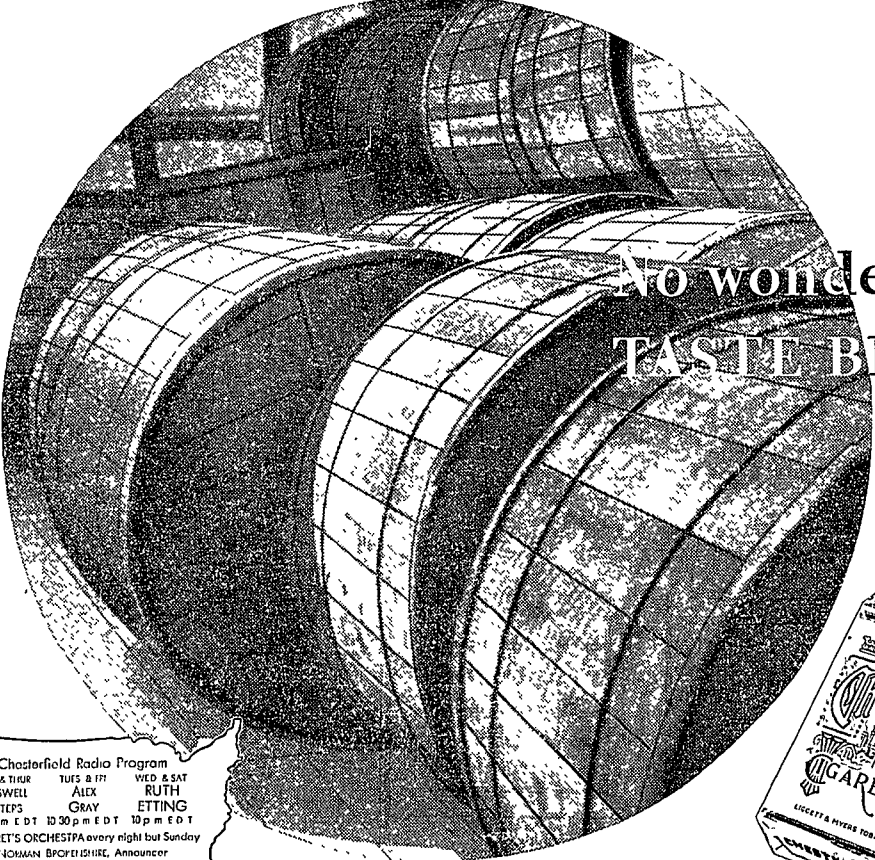
