**Soldier, Poet To Speak**

Dr. H. E. Howe, editor of the Journal of Industrial and Engineering Chemistry, will lecture on "Science Remaking the World," Thursday, July 28.

Tom Skayhill, soldier, poet, and author, is scheduled to speak on "The Last of the Long Hunters," Tuesday, August 2. That same day "Some National Developments in the Field of Vocational Education," will be discussed by Lindley H. Dennis.

Replacing Dr. Clyde Fisher, who was scheduled to speak Wednesday, August 3, on "Our Place in the Milky Way Galaxy," George E. Sokolsky, authority on political and economic conditions in Russia and the Far East, will speak. Prof. George J. The new structure was erected during the past year along with the home economics building as the result of a special building appropriation passed by the last regular session of the State Legislature.

**INTER-SESSION HAS HIGH ENROLLMENT**

Attendance Shows 5 Percent Increase As 224 Students Register For 2-Weeks' Course

Two hundred twenty-four students attended Inter-session, two-week concentrated period of study which closed Saturday, to surpass last year's record enrollment of 213 students by a five percent increase.

Seventy percent of all Inter-session students will continue their studies in the regular Summer Session, Prof.

Palmer C. Weaver, assistant director of the Summer Session, stated. Inter-session courses were inaugurated three years ago.

Other summer educational projects of the College include the six weeks Summer Session branch at Altoona, where the enrollment is expected to pass last year's mark, and courses in municipal and Pennsylvania government conducted by Dr. Harold P. Alderfer, professor of political science, in Harrisburg.

In addition, summer forestry courses are offered at Mont Alto, a civil engineering camp is maintained near Williamsport, and a nature and geology camp conducted at other points in the State. Gross enrollment at these camps reached 148 last year.

**BANNER SAILS FOR RUSSIA**

Prof. Franklin C. Banner, head of the journalism department, has sailed from New York City on a summer tour that will keep him for two months in Russia. He will sojourn in England before continuing to the Soviet state and upon his return.

Professor Banner plans to write his impressions of Russia as gathered in the two-months stay. He will also send letters for use in the Summer COLLEGIAN.
