CRAWFORD AGRARIANS ENTER OIL BUSINESS

Agricultural Economist Describes Activities of County Farmers

Farmers of Crawford county through their cooperative dairy improvement and sales association have gone into the oil business, says Frank E. Manning, extension agricultural economist of the College.

Commodities handled are oil, gasoline, kerosene, naphtha, tractor fuel, heavy grease, and fly spray. Sales are made at competitive prices, and it is the intention to pay a substantial patronage dividend at the end of the year.

Four trucks with a total capacity of 2,515 gallons are used. Business for the first month amounted to 21,000 gallons, from 1,500 to 2,000 gallons being sold daily.

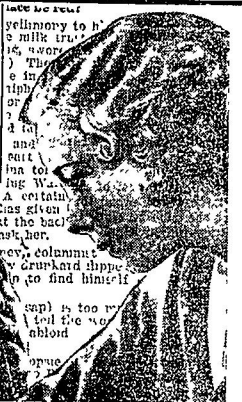
