

INSTITUTE OF URBAN PROBLEMS TO MEET

First Sessions Will Convene at College in 2-Day Program From July 27-29

The first Institute of Urban Problems will hold its sessions at Penn State from Wednesday, July 27, to Friday, July 29. How the family and particularly the children are being affected by current conditions will be the subject for consideration by one of the five sections of the Institute.

Reports and summaries of the discussions and conclusions will be presented on the last morning of the meetings. Three of the five sections will consider finances of boroughs and cities, and the other two will weigh problems dealing with the well-being and living conditions of the community. Starting with urban taxation problems, the financial section will include a study of municipal budgeting and experiences with city managers. The other two sections will be the one on family and child welfare and that on water supply and sanitation.

Speakers Engaged
Following each session on family and child welfare problems will be a general discussion in which all interested may participate. Meetings of all sections in the Institute will be open to any citizen of the State. The first paper in the welfare section will be presented by J. Prentice Murphy, executive secretary of the Children's Bureau of Philadelphia, on the topic, "Family Welfare and Children's Needs."

Mrs. Helen Glenn Tyson, deputy secretary of the State Department of Welfare, Miss Abigail Brownell, acting secretary of the child welfare division, Public Charities association of Philadelphia, Mr. Leon Stein, secretary and director of research, Pennsylvania Committee on Penal Affairs, and Miss Edith M. Everett, leader of the section, are other speakers engaged.

Comeback of Dobbin Shown by Increase in Horse Purchases

Reports coming from DuBois, to Charles A. Buige, horse extension specialist of the College, indicate that more than 1,000 horses have been distributed this year to farms within 30 or 40 miles of that city. Forty-three carloads had been brought in up to the end of the second week in June.

Old Dobbin seems to be making a remarkable and unexpected comeback, and is bringing with him a revival of the blacksmith and harness-making trades that bring back memories of a decade ago.

The horses are being used to replace tractors in many instances, and in others to increase the horsepower on the farms for the rush season. Farmers are willing to admit that more speed and power are supplied by the tractors and that they have the advantage of consuming fuel only when in operation. Many of the soil tillers, however, like horses better for plowing and other farm work, especially where fields are small and on hillsides.

In many sections of the State farmers are using multiple hitched which permit one man to drive four or more horses in a team. Most farmers grow their own horse feed which is a factor now when money for the purchase of fuel is not plentiful.

ENROLLMENT RIVALS 1931'S

With the matriculation of 2,804 students at the opening of Summer Session, the number of summer students studying at the Pennsylvania State College is rapidly approaching that recorded last year when the Penn State Summer Session reached a total enrollment of 3,604.

In addition to the 2,804 on the campus, 194 students are attending the Altoona Branch of the Summer Session, eleven are enrolled in courses in State government at Harrisburg, 140 are enrolled in summer camps and 225 were present for Inter-Session. Total summer enrollment to date is 3,374.

FIRST SWIMMING CLASS CONVENES

Precedent at Penn State Set When Course in Water Mobilization Is Offered to Students

Penn State's swimming class had its inaugural instruction in one of the pools near State College on Tuesday night. The class, under the direction of Miss Terese Powdermaker, a graduate student from the New York University, totals more than forty women students of the Twenty-Third Summer Session.

Part of the group is taking this course for credit, while the remaining number of the class enrolled for the recreation that can be secured from it. The class is divided into three sections: for beginners, those in the intermediate stage, and those who are qualified swimmers.

Before being admitted to take this course, all registrants are required to pass the College health examination. The bacteriology department of the College will continue to analyze the water in which the class receives its instruction from Miss Powdermaker.

With the establishment of this new course, there is the hope that it will lead to the beginning of a varsity swimming team at the College during the regular session. Dr. Elwood C. Davis, professor of physical education said Wednesday.

DO YOU SWIM?

THE PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH has formulated certain rules and regulations governing the operation of swimming pools and bathing beaches within the state. Some of the important regulations you will be interested in.

ARTICLE IV---Quality of Water.

SECTION 1.---The water used at all bathing places shall at all times have a chemical content and quality acceptable to the Department of Health, and accordingly said Department will determine what purification processes, if any, are needed to accomplish this end.

SECTION 2.---Effective disinfection is required of the water in all swimming pools. Whenever chlorine, calcium hypochlorite or other chlorine compounds are used for swimming pool disinfection, the amount of available or excess chlorine in the water at all times when the pool is in use shall not be less than 0.1 p. p. m. nor more than 0.5 p. p. m.

SECTION 4.---All water in the pool shall at times of use be BRIGHT and CLEAR.

SECTION 5.---Not more than two out of five samples of the water supply admitted to the swimming pool or of the water in any part of the pool, when the pool is in use, collected on the same day or not more than three out of any ten consecutive such samples collected on different dates, shall show a positive test for B. Coli in 10 c. c.
