40 Candidates Engage in Daily Practices—7 Lettermen Return to Squad

Fifteen-minute scrimmages, goal kicking, "heading" practice using a volleyball net, and rope skipping was the program for Lion soccer team candidates this week. The first scrimmage was held Monday.

Arrivals—this week have swelled the size of the squad to forty. In addition to seven lettermen headed by Captain Al Daykin, all-American center halfback, nearly a dozen other men who had experience with the team last year have joined the ranks. Chadwick, Manwaring, V o s b u r y, Tully, Lindquist, Altemus, Hansen, Young, Hoffeditz, and Wood are among the booters who will probably defend the Lion soccer record.

Lion Prospects Encouraging
Sophomore soccermen include Hill, Sigel, Graham, Ambler, Fletcher, Hallman, and Ostrom. Additional men who registered late have continued to increase the numbers of the soccer squad this week.

Coach Bill Jeffrey regards this season's prospects as encouraging for the Blue and White booters. Lafayette, the team which will open the season here October 8, was a Lion victim last year 4-to-0, although rumor says the Leopards will put up a tougher scrap this fall.

To Meet Army
Haverford and Syracuse are two 1931 opponents who tied the Lion booters. Penn State soccermen will meet Haverford on their home field on October 29 and Syracuse here November 5. Other games will be Harvard at Cambridge October 15 and Springfield at Springfield October 17. The final game of the season will bring Army here November 19.
