

### GERMAN INVASION OF FRANCE IMPOSSIBLE, STUDENT ASSERTS

"France could not possibly be invaded by German troops," Helmut Miller-Stock, German graduate student of the School of Mineral Industries, maintains.

"Germany, with a limited army of 100,000 men and an ammunition supply equal only to the amount used during one day of fighting in the World War, is absolutely at the mercy of France. Yet France uses Germany's armament as an argument in her policy of keeping her natural enemy in subjection," continued Miller-Stock.

Declining to predict the winner of the next Reichstag election because of the closeness of the campaign between the Nazi faction and the National Socialist party, the graduate student nevertheless vouched for the popularity of the Hitlerites. This is contrary to published reports in this country that their leader's mud-slinging campaign against Germany's idol, President Paul Von Hindenburg, and Chancellor Von Papen is losing Hitler favor with the populace.

Cancellation of war debt payments was the only way to solve Germany's problem, Miller-Stock said, as even in times of comparative prosperity incomes were taxed about twenty per cent.

The German student looks upon the prohibition law in the United States as unnecessary. Cases of intoxication are rare in Germany, he pointed out, and the laissez-faire policy of the government there seems quite adequate.

Miller-Stock is a graduate scholar in metallurgy and will spend at least one year studying at Penn State. After completing his high school course in Frankfort-on-Main, where he was born, Miller-Stock was graduated from a German gymnasium, in Freiberg, a town about 120 miles south of Berlin.

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### ORATORS CHOSEN TO MEET OXFORD

Keyes '32, Berbatis '35, To Engage Ervine, Wilson in Split-Team Debate November 28

Scott Keyes '32 and Angelo N. Berbatis '35 have been selected by Joseph F. O'Brien, men's debating coach, to engage the English debaters from Oxford University in a split-team contest here November 28.

A. J. Ervine and Geoffrey M. Wilson, both of Oriel College, Oxford, will represent the English university in the contest. One will pair with a Penn State debater to defend the affirmative side of the question "Resolved, that socialism provides no remedy for the present economic disorder," while an Oxford and a Penn State man will uphold the negative.

Both Ervine and Wilson are studying for the bar and both are past presidents of the Oxford Union, in addition to heading other organizations. This season marks the second year of intercollegiate debating for Keyes and Berbatis.

Dr. J. J. Osuna '12, of the University of Puerto Rico, who is exchanging his services with Dr. Carroll D. Champlin, of the Education School, this semester, will probably preside at the debate. While in college, Dr. Osuna was a junior orator and intercollegiate debating champion.
