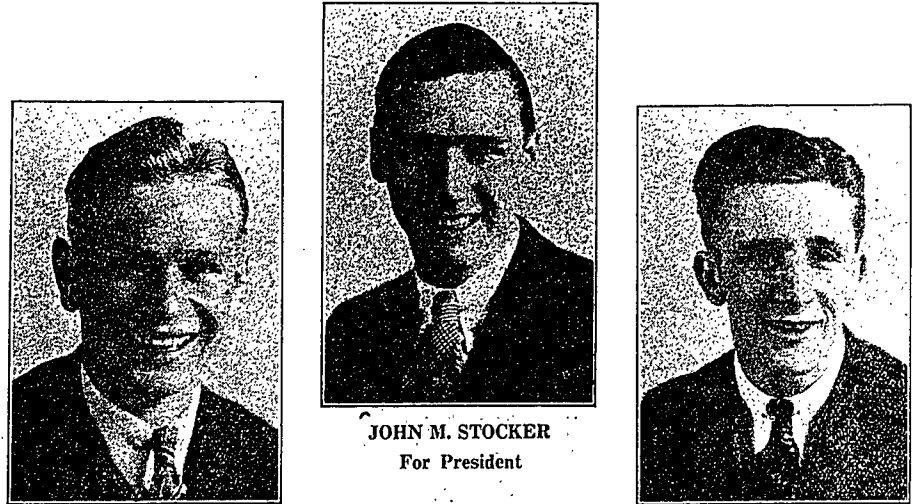

Public sentiment is definitely opposed to the cancellation of war debts, according to statistics based on the record of Penn State debating teams argued the current year. The question argued in a majority of contests was, "Resolved, that all intergovernmental war debts, including reparations, should be cancelled."

Attacking the proposed plan of war debt cancellation, negative teams won all four of their judges' decision contests. In five debates thus far this season, advocates of cancellation were unable to convince judges of the practicability of their plan.

Participating in three debates, women orators advocated full payment of debts, and won two victories and one tie decision. In their only contest this season, the freshman team argued the negative side of the question in a non-decision meet with Allegheny College debaters.
