

### College Will Play Host to Scores Of Schoolboy Athletes on May 6

Penn State will play host to scores of schoolboy athletes at the annual interscholastic track and field meet on May 6, Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, announced yesterday.

Nine schools have signified their intention of entering men in the meet, according to entries already received. Most of them will compete with full teams, but several smaller schools will enter only their outstanding performers.

Bedford High, Strong Vincent High of Erie, Hummelstown High, East Penn's Valley High of Millheim, Lewistown High, Woodward Township High of Houtzdale and Wyoming Seminary at Kingston are the nine entrants to date. With the date of the meet just a month distant, it is expected that many others will

soon register for the meet. The teams are divided into two groups or classes, Class A for preparatory schools, and Class B for high schools. This division permits the athletes to engage in competition with their equal in age and experience.

In the Class A competition, Kiski has annexed the trophy and the championship for the last three years. Altoona High school is the leader in Class B, as the school has also won the championship in that division for the last three years.

The meet will be held in conjunction with the dual meet with North Carolina on May 6. Trials and eliminations in both classes will be run off during the morning, with the finals for both the preparatory and high school teams being held with the scheduled varsity meet in the afternoon.

### FENCERS DEFEAT LEHIGH FOILSMEN

Lion Squad Offsets 3-to-1 Loss in 'Epee' Bout To Win Match By 3 Counters

By winning seven out of nine foil encounters, Nittany Lion fencers offset a 3-to-1 loss in epee bouts to win their season's contest 8-to-5 from Lehigh foilmen at Bethlehem Saturday.

Only three men made the trip to represent the Lions, Rojohan being absent from the line-up, while Lehigh was represented by a full four-man team. Despite the fact that doubling was necessary, the Nittany trio completely outclassed their opponents.

Captain Marty Hesch, by winning three foils and an epee tilt, led the scoring for the Nittany fencers. Lipetzky and Kreeger tied for second honors with each winning two foil bouts.

Biro and Deemer, who represented Lehigh in epee encounters, captured three of the four bouts. Liggett and Fryo, who completed the Lehigh line-up, assisted by Deemer gained but two points out of a possible nine in foil bouts.
