Penn State hospitality has become a tradition and it is thus with a keen desire to uphold its reputation that the College extends a hearty welcome to students of its twenty-fourth Summer Session.

Despite the fact that early indications point toward a 33 percent decrease in attendance under that of the 1932 Summer Session with a resulting decrease in financial returns to the College, there has been no attempt to meet this decrease by weakening the instructional staff or cutting any part of the Summer Session program.

In the final reckoning, however, what the Summer Session student gains from his stay here is dependent entirely upon himself. There is opportunity for both work and pleasure.

Something of the policies to be pursued by the Summer Session Collegian is pertinent at this time. The staff, composed of members of the staff of the Collegian published during the academic year, is anxious to meet the needs of its subscribers with a newspaper of as high a quality as possible.

Recognizing the financial needs of the students, College authorities have led the way toward reduction of living expenses for this summer. Fraternity and private rooming and boarding houses quickly followed suit.

Organization of unofficial fraternity rooming houses for men to place them under College supervision comes as a wise and necessary move. Whether or not objections and comments raised against the conduct of those living in unofficially opened houses have been justified, the move places the system above board.

A reduction in the golf course fees would not be amiss this year. While some charge is justified in view of the expense of maintaining the course, the present fee of ten dollars is without doubt out of the question for a larger number of Summer Session students.

The decision to abandon the Summer Players organization for this year will be a disappointment to those interested in the field of dramatics. It is difficult to believe that enough support for Players productions cannot be gained from a student body of the type found at Summer Session.
