

### COLLEGE OFFERS ADMISSION TO 613

College feels that, as a State institution, it has a special responsibility, and it is taking steps to meet it. During recent years we have had to turn away a great many applicants, but this year, because of the critical need of many high school graduates to attend a college where the cost is relatively low, we are making adjustments which will allow us to admit a larger class than ever before.

"As a second step in making it possible for young men and women to continue their education, reductions have been made by the College in the expense for room and board; 15 per cent in room rent for men, 10 per cent in room rent for women, and 15 per cent in board for women. Rates in the town will be influenced by these reductions. These reductions and the low fee charges made possible because of State and federal aid offer educational opportunity of high quality and broad scope to Pennsylvania students at moderate cost.

"At a time like this it is the duty of the College as a State institution to make these facts generally known. Your cooperation in bringing these advantages to the attention of the high school graduates in your vicinity as soon as possible will be helpful to them. Please suggest to these young men and women and their parents that they write to the Registrar for information, or better, that they visit the College. In this way we shall be certain that the facilities of the College will be of service up to the new limit of capacity."

### BOROUGH WILL INCREASE COLLEGE AVENUE WIDTH

To Widen Main Thoroughfare from Frazier to Pugh Streets

Plans for the widening of College Avenue have been approved, an appropriation of \$500 has been made by the borough council, and work will begin sometime this summer. Present plans call for the widening this summer of the piece of roadway between Frazier and Pugh street.

The new width to be added will vary between four and six feet, as at the present time the avenue is of varying widths at different places. Macadam construction will be used in widening the street.

The front campus was constructed along College Avenue recently so as to prepare for the widening of the street. As a result, no sidewalks, trees, or shrubbery will be moved by the College as the town engineers complete their plan.

### ROGERS HAS CLOSE ESCAPE WHILE SWIMMING IN RIVER

While swimming in the Neuse river near his home in Raleigh, N. C., Henry H. Rogers, a member of the Physics department of the College, narrowly escaped drowning last Sunday afternoon.
