**THEATRE TO SHOW FOREIGN PICTURE**

French Institute Will Sponsor Film, 'A Nous la Liberte' Here  
On Wednesday

Summer Session students will be given an opportunity to witness a French motion picture Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock when "A Nous la Liberte" is presented in a special matinee at the Catham theatre. The film is being presented at the request of the Institute of French Education authorities.

"A Nous la Liberte" is a musical farce written and directed by Rene Clair, prominent French director, and has enjoyed long runs in Europe and New York since its release early this year. It is regarded by critics as one of the outstanding films of the year.

The cast of "A Nous la Liberte" is headed by Henri Marchand, Raymond Cordy and Mme. Rolla France, regarded as three of the most promising stars of French motion pictures. The dialogue and songs are spoken and sung in French.

"A Nous la Liberte" was one of a series of foreign-made films which were presented at the College last spring and found favor with those who saw it at that time.

**MISS FISHER WILL GIVE TALK ON DANCE TODAY**

Discussing the "Place of Dance in Education," Miss Amy Fisher of the School of Physical Education and Athletics Summer Session faculty will present the second lecture of a series sponsored by that School in Recreation hall this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Three lectures in the series are scheduled next week, the first to be given Wednesday afternoon by Frederick Foertsch, assistant physical education director in the Philadelphia schools, on the subject "Character education through physical education." Earle E. "Spike" Leslie, varsity basketball coach, will talk on "Faults in high school basketball players who enter college" in the second lecture scheduled for Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Nelson S. Walke, assistant professor of physical education and athletics, will discuss "The place of adaptive physical education in the modern health and physical education program," in the third lecture Friday afternoon. All lectures are open to the public.

**INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS COUNCIL SPONSORS DISPLAY**

The State College International Relations Council is sponsoring a display entitled, "Facing the Problems of Peace and War," which will be exhibited in the Hugh Beaver Room of Old Main every afternoon from Monday until Friday.

The exhibit will include a comprehensive collection of books, pamphlets, and posters, issued by the leading national and international organizations advocating "disarmament" or "preparedness." Samples of free literature will be available.

**Summer Session Chorus to Present Composition of Music Student Here**

"Trail Makers," a musical composition by Maxwell MacMichael, of the Institute of Music Education, is now being studied by the Summer Session mixed chorus of 125 voices under the direction of Prof. Richard W. Grant, and will be presented by the organization at the Summer Sessions commencement.

The song, the words and music of which were written by Mr. MacMichael, supervisor of Public School music in the public schools of Perth Amboy, N. J., who is spending his fifth summer at the College institute of music, was first written as a part of a pageant presented by the Perth Amboy grammar schools in February of the year. The song met with such popularity that Mr. MacMichael consented to have it prepared for a chorus, and with this in mind he transcribed it this month for the local chorus.

The composer attempts to catch the heroic spirit of the westward movement as a whole rather than individual manifestations. The pageant, of which it was a part, presented American history prior to 1860.

This composition is not the first to be presented by Mr. MacMichael at Penn State. Last year his "My Love is Like a Red, Red Rose" was presented at the commencement exercises by the College chorus under the direction of Prof. Grant. It constituted as a part of the work of both the College chorus and music composition courses here.

Other compositions of Mr. MacMichael include "The Snow," "Song of the Rain," "A Christmas Carol," "Blessed Lord," a communion anthem, and his "My Love is Like a Red, Red Rose."

At present Mr. MacMichael is engaged in the composition of a group which sets to music some of Shakespeare's poetry. Among others this group will include "It Was a Lover and His Lass" and "Blow, Blow, Thy Winter Wind."

**Basketball, Track Courses To Start Here on Monday**

**Leslie, Walke To Teach Coaching Classes For Men**

Special three-weeks courses in basketball coaching for men and track and field coaching for men will get under way Monday under the direction of Earle E. "Spike" Leslie, varsity basketball coach, and Nelson S. Walke, assistant professor of physical education.

The courses follow similar three-weeks programs in football coaching, taught by "Bob" Higgins, varsity football mentor, and swimming, taught by Leslie. Fifteen were registered in the grid coaching course while ten were enrolled in the swimming course.

**Graduated From Oregon**

Leslie, who will have charge of the course in basketball coaching, joined the staff of the School of Physical Education and Athletics last summer, serving as assistant football coach and head basketball coach in addition to teaching professional classes. A graduate of the University of Oregon, he was freshman football and assistant varsity basketball coach at that institution from 1925 to 1929, turning out four undefeated grid teams and helping to coach two Pacific Coast championship teams in basketball. From 1929 to 1931 he was coach at Montclair, N. J. State Teachers College.

Taking charge of the Nittany Lion basketball team last winter, Leslie directed his charges to seven victories in an eleven-game schedule. Army, Carnegie Tech, West Virginia, Washington and Jefferson College and Lafayette were numbered among the victims of the Lion courtmen last winter.

Walke, a graduate of the Normal College of Indianapolis and the University of Cincinnati, joined the Penn State faculty at the same time as Leslie and last fall coached the freshman football team.

**CAP, GOWN ORDERING TO BEGIN WEDNESDAY**

Orders for caps and gowns for the Summer Session commencement will be taken in room 35 of the Education building on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock in the morning, 2 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and 7 and 8 o'clock at night.

Prices for bachelor's caps and gowns will be \$2.25, those for masters, \$2.75, and doctor's \$3.25, with additional charges for master's and doctor's degree hoods. A deposit of \$2.50 will be refunded when the gown is returned, will be required on all gowns.

Caps and gowns will be distributed beginning Wednesday morning, August 9 and continue all day on Thursday, August 10. All gowns must be returned by Friday noon, August 11.

**4 TEAMS TIED FOR FIRST PLACE IN MUSHBALL LEAGUE**

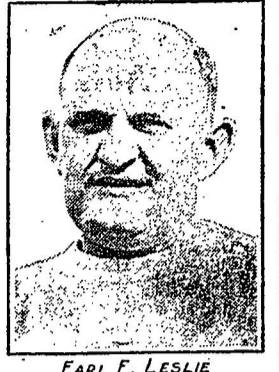
