

Campus Honor Societies Perform Triple Function

Lion's Paw, Senior Group, Constitutes Highest Recognition for Undergraduates

Eight campus honor societies exist for the promotion of the Penn State spirit, for the maintenance of the Penn State honor code, and for the preservation of the Penn State traditions.

The highest honor which an undergraduate may attain is election to Lion's Paw, a senior society. Lion's Paw was founded in 1907, and has as its purpose the furtherance of the best interests of the College.

Membership is limited to fifteen outstanding seniors. The society is not necessarily conspicuous in its efforts toward advancing the ideals of the College, but seeks to accomplish

results by directing and assisting all organizations which are concerned in the welfare of the institution.

Upperclass Societies

Other upperclass societies are Skull and Bones and Parmi Nous, whose memberships are composed of prominent seniors and juniors. Athletes, sports managers, and other upperclassmen prominent in extra-curricular activities are elected to the societies, which are identified by distinguishing hats.

These organizations have as their purposes the promotion of good fellowship among all college men regardless of class or fraternity affiliation, the support of a worthy student enterprise, and the promotion of college spirit. In addition, they seek to correct any tendency toward a disregard for College traditions and customs.

Blue Key, founded in 1923, is a society composed entirely of members of

the junior class. Its membership is made up of assistant sports managers, as well as men chosen from other junior activities.

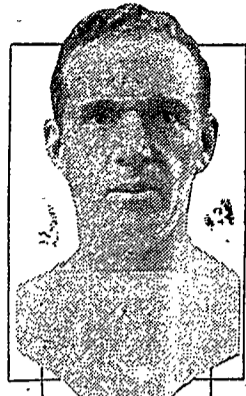

Sophomore Societies

Sophomore societies include Druids, founded in 1907, and Friars, established in 1912. Their primary purpose is the maintenance of College customs, especially those pertaining to freshmen. They also endeavor to foster and promote good sportsmanship at athletic contests, and promote the general welfare of the College.

Archousal and Owens are the two campus societies open to women students. The former group is composed of a limited number of prominent senior women, while membership in the latter is restricted to sophomores conspicuous in some activity.

11 VARSITY TEAMS BATTLE FOR LIONS

5 Freshman Groups Compete For Yearlings—1 Gain Individual Titles

Penn State is represented in the field of intercollegiate athletics by eleven varsity teams and five freshman aggregations, which each year meet college representatives from all over the country.

Football, baseball, soccer, basketball, lacrosse, boxing, wrestling, cross-country, track, tennis, and golf are the varsity sports, while the freshmen represent the Lions in football, baseball, basketball, track, and cross-country competition.

Last year Lion teams as a whole had mediocre seasons, and none gained an intercollegiate championship. Four team members, however, won championships.

Captain Johnny McAndrews and Johnny Napoleon won the intercollegiate 135 and 115-pound championships, respectively, at the National Intercollegiate Boxing tournament, "King" Cole won the heavyweight title and Bob Ellstrom the 118-pound championship at the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling tournament held in New York City last winter.

Gridmen Begin Practice

Lion gridmen began preparation Wednesday for a seven-game football schedule that will bring them into competition with such teams as Columbia University and the Red and Blue of the University of Pennsylvania. The first three games of the schedule will be played on New Beaver field.

Opening the season on October 7, when Lebanon Valley will be met, the Lions will play Muhlenberg College and Lehigh University on successive weeks. The Lehigh game will be the attraction for Dads Day, October 21. On October 28, the Lions will meet Columbia University and the follow-

ing Saturday will see them in Syracuse. The last home game of the season will be against Johns Hopkins University, and the season will end on November 18 in Franklin Field, Philadelphia, against the University of Pennsylvania.

Following a mediocre season last year after being undefeated four seasons out of the last six, an even tougher schedule has been arranged for the Nittany soccer team this fall. Six games have been arranged and five will be played here.

Season Opens October 14

The season opens against Temple on October 14, and for the next five Saturdays the Lion booters will take the field against Navy, Lafayette, Syracuse, Alumni, and Illinois University in that order. The Navy game is the only contest scheduled on a foreign field.

Cross-country competition will get under way on October 21 against Lehigh. Two weeks later the Lion hill and dalers will meet Syracuse, also

while Mont Alto Branch school will finish the Cub's schedule on November 18.

Freshmen gridmen are scheduled to play four games, all at home. The season will open on October 21 against Villanova freshmen and the Lion plebes will meet Gettysburg on the following Saturday. The freshmen will meet Bucknell on Armistice Day.
