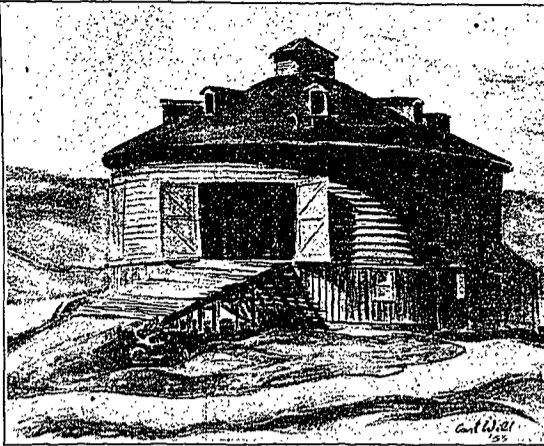

negotiation of the loan is absolutely essential to the fulfillment of the budget for the current biennium of State administration. It is pre-eminently essential to the carrying out of the program of state relief, because this loan is to provide very nearly half of the State's appropriation to that purpose."—Philadelphia Evening Bulletin.

"For the past four years the free or charity wards of our hospitals have been thrown open to care for the unfortunate victims of the depression. Unstintingly the hospitals have given of their medical and surgical care. They have provided medicine, food, nursing care, clean, comfortable beds and in many instances clothing after their convalescence. All this the hospitals have done even in view of the fact that their state appropriation has been cut several times, owing to inadequate State revenue. Nor have the hospitals received aid from welfare or charitable organizations with which to carry on this charitable work.

"The relief bond issue—which will appear on the November ballot—is their hope. If passed this will provide \$25,000,000 for relief organizations, of this sum \$2,231,365 will be divided among 163 hospitals of Pennsylvania to help enable them to care for the sick poor."—Pittsburgh Press.

"Direct donations by the public have decreased alarmingly, and many hospitals face serious curtailment of service or closure. Unless Amendment Number 8 is passed; many needed hospitals will be forced to close in the near future."—Altoona Tribune.

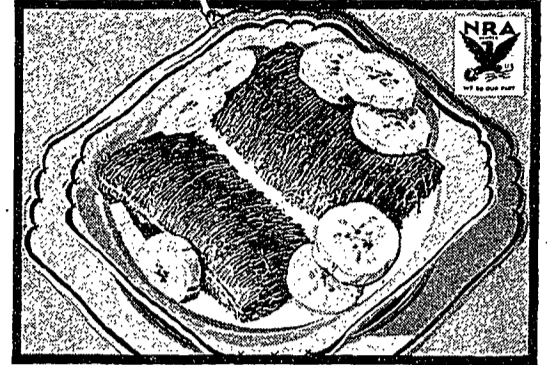
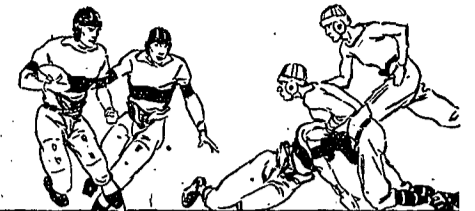
