ported at the alumni office at noon today. Representing a definite cross-section of the vote in the State, the way improvements.

Twenty-one counties out of the sixty-seven in the State had been re-averaged majority ran about four to five thousand.

#### Over 100 Students Vote

Telegrams from alumni chairmen, unable to get absolute figures on the balloting, inform the administration that the vote is running from 2-to-1 to as high as 8-to-1 majorities. Counties included in this report are Dauphin, Lancaster, Butler, Bucks, Schuylkill, Washington, Northampton, Lawrence, and Berks.

About 100 or more members of the student body were excused from their classes on Tuesday in order to return home to cast their ballots, according to a check-up made at the office of the Dean of Men yesterday. No definite figures were kept on the number of students who received excuses, it was stated.

Heads of the College administration and members of the faculty are jubilant today over the passage of the Amendment. Counties in which the \$8,000,000 bond issue for expansion here was defeated in the elections five years ago, gave majorities of a thousand or more on the question of the present issue, and officially this change is seen as added future support for the institution.

### Lederer Rebukes Council's Decision In Campbell Case

"As long as I am in office, I will continue to regard the rights of the students here as of paramount importance," said Burgess Eugene E. Lederer in attempting to justify his re-suspension of Officer Campbell of the local police force.

Taking statements from several students, the Burgess suspended Campbell from the town police after investigating the manner in which he attempted to handle the student pajama parade of last Tuesday night. At that time, Campbell is alleged to have fired a gun into the air while attempting to disperse the parade.

At the regular meeting of the town council Monday night, Officer Campbell was re-instated on the police force. The first official act of Burgess Lederer as he entered his office at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning was again to suspend the officer.

"I shall continue to suspend Campbell just as long as the council reinstates him on the force," Lederer declared. "He was suspended for two weeks, and until he has served that time, he will not be a member of my force. Students' rights must be respected during the balance of my term of office."

noes. Amendment Number 7, specifying that individuals, associations and corporations shall have equal rights to have persons and property transported over railroads and canals, was also accepted by a vote of 727 to 426.

Besides the overwhelming majority given to Amendment Number 8 here, the \$10,000,000 bond issue for the acquiring of toll bridges, Amendment Number 12, tallied 712 votes for 675 against it to pass.

Other State amendments were defeated. Amendment Number 4, providing for \$50,000,000 for veterans' pensions, was rejected by a vote of 1084 to 593, about a two-to-one majority. Amendments Number 2 and 6 also lost by almost two-to-one majorities, while the balloting on the oth-

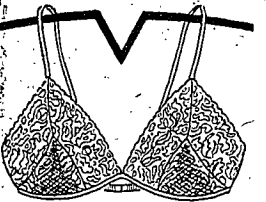

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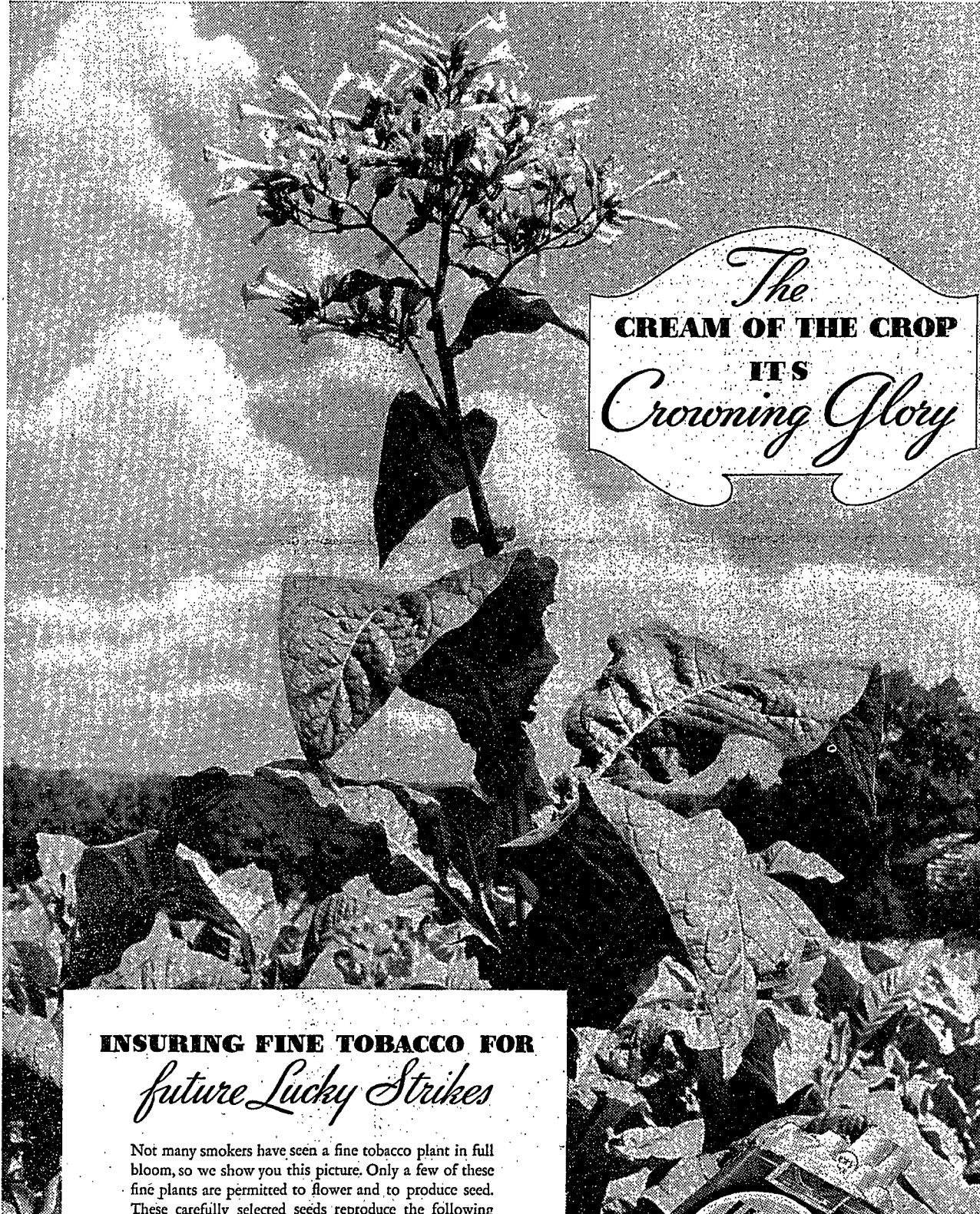
